FIRE DESTROYS SHINGLE MILL

Plant of Allan Hicks at Dalhouse Junction Totally Destroyed.

HEAVY LOSS

Last Friday afternoon the quiet little town of Dalhouse Junction was thrown into consternation by the cry of fire. Rushing to their doors the people were amazed to see sheets of flame rising from the shingle mill owned and operated by Mr. Allan Hicks. Willing hands were soon at work and the knowledge of the plentiful supply of water calmed the panic of the people. The flames by this time had a firm hold of the building and the fire fighters seeing it was doomed turned their attention to the surrounding buildings which were threatened. In a short time the mill was in ruins and at total loss. It cannot be conjectured how the fire originated as there was no one on the premises at the time. The loss will be about \$6000 with no insurance, much valuable machinery being only recently installed.

RESTIGOUCHE CLUB AT SUSSEX

County Rifleman do Well at the P. R. A. Meeting Just Closed.

SPLENDID SHOOTING

The annual P. R. A. meeting held at Sussex terminated last Friday, at which the local rifle club were very successful. In all the matches the members of the club made a good showing, and much satisfaction is expressed at the various results. In the Nursery match as in all the matches the members of the club were well up in the prize list.

The Maiden team tied with the winners St. John with a score of 11 points higher than last year.

In the Grand Aggregate Dr. Ellis Jacquet River was third, winning the Bronze Medal and P. W. Hamilton was eighth, a great record for a new shot. Mr. Hamilton also won the maiden aggregate with a record score of 258, 29 points higher than the winners score last year.

A. H. English won the Governor-General's medal one of the Blue Ribbons of the meet, from a field of twenty competitors, consisting of the highest twenty in the Grand Aggregate.

For the first time Restigouche was represented in the county match and tied with Westmorland for second place with the following scores:

This was 44 points better than what was required to win the match last year and 29 points behind Carleton County who won the match with a record score of 761, a higher total than that which won the Kolapore Cup at Bisley this year.

A feature of this match was a possible at 200 yards by John Chandler for which he received the glad hand on all sides from his fellow competitors. In another competition this young shot had another possible at 500 yards while T. Carter performed the same feat at 600 yards.

The meeting was the most successful ever held in Sussex, the scores being exceptionally high and a vast improvement on that of former years.

The Restigouche team, was accompanied by Tris White as mascot, who acted as one of the register keepers and was congratulated for the efficiency and accuracy of his work.

The weather conditions during the meet were fairly favorable, but could have been much better. A heavy thunderstorm accompanied by drenching rain on Wednesday night left the range in a rather liquid state. Many of the older shots however, seemed to enjoy their return to the days of their childhood in many places wading in water up to their knees. It was treated by them as a huge joke and the catch word of the hour was "Come in, the water's fine." All the members of the team, who returned on Saturday morning, thoroughly enjoyed themselves and were unanimous in expressing their intention to return next year when they hope their number will be considerably augmented by a record entry of young shots.

BANK OF COMMERCE BUYS GOOD SITE

Hon. Geo. E. Foster has spent the last week at the Luch Arran Hotel, Dalhousie, taking a rest, but Wednesday went fishing on the Jacquet River with W. S. Montgomery. He hooked seven salmon and was successful in landing four of them.

Mr. Foster has not cast a fly for thirty years but so well pleased with his trip that he expressed his desire to join the club and come every year. He stated that it brought back his first recollections of Restigouche county, when 41 years ago he came up the St. John river and down the Restigouche on a fishing trip.
Hon. Mr. Foster left Thursday for Ottawa.

DALHOUSIE HAS ANOTHER BLAZE

Mill of Sydney Lumber Co., Destroyed on Sunday Morning.

100 MEN IDLE

At Dalhousie more than 100 men were thrown out of employment by the burning early Sunday morning of the saw mill owned by the Sydney Lumber Company. The mill was running up till 12 o'clock Saturday night and the fire was discovered a short time later by the watchman.

The property included a saw-shed and, stove mill and was located at the west end of the town and close to the L. C. R. buildings and sheds owned by A. & R. LeBlanc, and O'Leary and Montgomery.

The fire was fanned by a west wind and for a time it seemed as though Dalhousie would be wiped out in the same way that Campbellton was a few years ago, and only the good work of the fire brigade saved the town.

The loss will amount to thousands of dollars. It is understood that steps will be taken immediately to rebuild and a mill for cutting deals will be erected first, in order to supply the nail works at Sydney.

It is expected that the company will erect a larger and more modern mill.

BIGGEST FISH

During the summer of 1911 Field and Stream, one of the Spotsman's magazines, introduced a prize fishing contest scheme to their readers offering valuable prizes for the biggest fish caught in any part of America.

Three of the leading were won by fish taken from Canadian summer resorts, reached by the Grand Trunk Railway System. The first Grand Prize was given for a lake trout weighing 28 pounds, caught in lake Temagami Ontario. The first grand prize for a black spotted Salmon trout was awarded to an angler who caught his fish in Algonquin National Park, the fish weighing 12 pounds. The ladies grand prize was awarded to a fair angler for a small mouth Black Bass weighing 6 pounds 4 oz. caught in the Georgian Bay.

ASSESSORS FINISH THEIR LABORS

List Now in Town Treasurer's Hands—Rate Lower Than Last Year.

A COMPARISON

The assessment lists for year 1912 are now completed and in the Town Treasurer's hands. There is an increase in real estate in all the wards, but a small decrease in income in Ward Vavo, and a decrease in personal property in Ward Three, as the following statement will show. The decrease in Ward Two can be accounted for by the fact that nearly all the floating population who were engaged in building operations were residents in this ward last year and are not here now. The total valuation of the town is \$2,293,700.00 which on an assessment of \$33,500 gives a rate of 1.45 per cent. The rate last year was 1.85 per cent on an assessment of \$30,000. The following figures will give an idea of comparison between the years 1911 and 1912.

TO CROSS ATLANTIC

German Engineer is Planning Gigantic Airship to Carry 300 Passengers.

Berlin, Aug. 18.—J. Boerner, a German engineer, is planning a gigantic airship which is to cross the Atlantic. The ship is to be 700 feet long and 72 feet wide. It will have 62 balloons and will be divided into eighteen sections, which will be surrounded with a layer of nitrogen. She will be equipped with thirty-four motors, each driving eight propellers and developing 6,500 horse-power. The ship will be capable of a speed of 75 miles an hour, and will be able to carry 300 persons for 82,000 miles. Leading experts are interested and talk of forming a company to run the ship and others like her.
