

HOW SHALL THE TOWN BE LIGHTED?

The Various Propositions That Were Submitted to the Committee—How and Electric Tenders.

There was a great gathering of mercantile and business luminaries at yesterday's meeting of the Fire and Gas Committee. First there was George Gooderham, then James Austin of the Consumers Gas Company, with Manager William H. Pearson. After him came Manager Wright of the Toronto Electric Light Company and ex-Ald. Pearson. Ald. Bell was in the chair and there were present: Ald. Hewitt, Swift, Frankland, J. E. Vennart, G. S. Macdonald, Maughan, Scott, McDougall, Shaw and Fire Secretary McGowan. Ald. Maughan was deputed to investigate the claims of the various fire and gas companies for an increase of salary, their present stipend being \$18 for salary, house rent and \$28 for the lighting of the city market by electricity. Ald. Swift objected that the strong force of light would keep the market open in the night and be a great nuisance to the residents in the vicinity. Ald. Vennart, the mover of the resolution, said that the market was not to be kept open in the night, but that the sub-committee in the matter had not reported action was deferred.

The opening of tenders for the supply of electric and gas lamps was proceeded with. The Toronto Electric Light Company, on a basis of 300 lamps, is a \$2000 market check and the following prices:

For 3 years' contract: 300 lamps, \$3500; 300 lamps, \$3500; 300 lamps, \$3500.

A second electric light tender styled No. 2 was sent in offering the Westinghouse system. There was no bid to check, however, for it was therefore declared informal, although there was a letter accompanying the tender offering the best possible service should be accepted. This closed the electric light tenders.

The Consumers' Company was the only tender in the matter of gas lamps, and like the electric company presented a \$2000 market check. Its first proposition was on the basis of the total lighting of the city by particular illuminator and ran as follows:

For two years: Lamps with burners consuming 4 cubic feet of gas per hour, 1000 lamps, \$2000; for total service of 4000 lamps, \$1000 per annum.

Ordinary gas lamps consuming 5 cubic feet per hour, each lamp \$1.50, per annum. Lamps, 35 cubic feet per hour, 150 lamps, \$2250; per annum.

Five years: Ordinary lamps, 4 cubic feet per hour, 150 lamps, \$2250; per annum. Lamps, 35 cubic feet per hour, 150 lamps, \$2250; per annum.

On a basis of 3000 lamps the following prices were submitted:

On motion Mr. Pearson moved that the committee composed of Ald. Maughan, Shaw, Macdonald, and McGowan, and the chairman was appointed to report upon the figures.

The contract for 4000 feet of hose was given to the Gutter Factory Manufacturing Company of Toronto, at the rate of 40¢ per foot, the brand being the Baker brand.

Secretary McGowan was instructed to advertise for tenders for the purchase of the firemen's clothing for the winter.

Death of a Hamiltonian in New York. HAMILTON, Sept. 3.—Last night John Brennan, 38, Highland street, New York, received a telegram from New York, informing him that his son, John Brennan, was dead. The telegram had been sent to another son of Brennan's in London, and was forwarded by him to Hamilton. Nothing was said about how he was killed or died from natural causes. The deceased worked for an electric light company, and his parents fear that he was killed by the family while on duty.

He was away from home for 14 years and paid his mother a visit about a year ago. He went from New York to Hamilton to see his mother and father. In May, 1889, Patrick Brennan, an older son of John Brennan's, was killed in a railway accident near Hamilton.
