





Half the boys' time is spent in academic studies, taught by qualified high school teachers and directly correlated , the practical work of the school They include all the subjects of the matriculation course, except Latin and French, which are optional. Practical nop work in machine shop practice,

lectrical work, woodworking, auto ngine work, applied science and raughting occupies the other half of he boys' school time. The first two years of the course is devoted to a general course which in-

cludes the essentials of a good general academic education with a sufficient variety of practical work to afford an opportunity of making an intelligent choice of a vocation for which the boy's aptitudes fit him. 
