Waiting for Better Days

For a generation that family had lived in a house with an irreducible minimum of furniture. But when better days came, and there was a modest sum available, it was spent on better accommodations and furnishings for the live stock. That was fine. That was humane. It was also good business.

In time the farm came to be one of the best equipped in several counties. The machinery was of the very latest and best description. The

live stock were glad and content to stay on the farm. But the young folks were not content to stay.

There were four sons and two daughters. A piece of furniture had been added to the house from time to time, generally the second-hand furniture store supplied the need. For years the family managed with just as little and as their furniture as could be made by their own hands. The stable and barn were comfortable, but inside the old farmhouse there was neither comfort nor beauty.
