ROYAL ASSENT TO THE CIVIL LIST BILL.—
His Excellency the Lieutenant governor has been pleased to direct the publication, in the Royal Gazette, of the following highly interesting and important Despatch, which was this day received from His Majesty's Secretary of State, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies
Govt. House, October 24, 1837.

DOWNING STREET, 29th August 1837.
SIR—I have had the honour to receive and say before the Queen your Despatch, No. 20 of the 17th ultimo, reporting that you had given your assent to a Bill for transferring to the crown and disposal of the General Assembly of New Brunswick, Her Majesty's several and sundry Rights, Privileges, and Immunities, in exchange for a Civil List.
Her Majesty has commanded me to instruct you to acquire the Legislative Council and Assembly, that it has been very gratifying for her to learn, that the arrangements proposed by His late Majesty to the Legislature
