The report of the Superintendent of Education for the year ending October 31st, 1876 is before us. We have not time to present an extended notice of this report, but can only glance at one or two of its leading features, reserving further comment until our next issue. It will be seen that the progress of Education, as represented by the report is gradual. The increase of schools for the year ending Oct. 31st, 1876 over the preceding year being twelve. By the table of attendance, we observe that during the year 9492 different pupils were registered, an increase of about one hundred over the preceding year. This, although it marks an improvement, can hardly be regarded as satisfactory in the main. There is a large number of children who notwithstanding the great advantages afforded them for obtaining a good common school education under our free system, are not enrolled upon the register of our schools, and who, despite the advantages offered them, are growing up in ignorance around us. It appears to us that the best and probably the only way to remedy this apparent evil is to introduce the compulsory system of education. This alteration may be regarded by some as obnoxious, inasmuch as it may possibly lead to litigation. But we have only to ask what return in its inception does not prove more or less obnoxious to certain classes? For example, our present system of free schools, at its introduction, was strenuously and bitterly opposed by a large and influential class, yet none will deny but that the system is admirable, and has wrought the most beneficial effects for the masses. We trust that the powers that be will take this matter into consideration and give it their attention, which its merits certainly demands. In our next issue we will give a further review of the report before us.

We regret to learn that the recent freshets have caused very serious damage in various sections of the County, particularly in the township of Wilmot and the eastern portion of the township of Annapolis. The roads have been engaged in lumbering operations in Annapolis township, opposite Paradise, lost about one hundred thousand of lumber and the Hon. W. C. Whitman, at Lawrencetown, is also a loser, we understand to a large extent. The logs and lumber from these two places are now floating in the Annapolis River, or have been left by the freshets on the marshes and intervals bordering the river. The roads have also suffered to a greater or less degree in many districts, thereby rendering travel difficult if not dangerous.

DEATH FROM LOCK-JAW.

An exceedingly melancholy death occurred here yesterday afternoon. About a fortnight ago, Everett, son of Calvin Raymond, Esq., of the eastern portion of his left hand, with an axe. The wound was dressed by members of the family, not being considered serious enough to demand the attendance of a medical man. One day last week, however, he got a thorough wetting, and on Sunday complained of rigidity when he attempted to pick up a piece of wood. Dr. Smith was called in and treated the symptoms as those of Tetanus or lock-jaw. His suspicions were confirmed, and he called in the assistance of Dr. Oakes. Under treatment the patient seemed in a condition warranting slight hope of recovery; but on Thursday, while eating a small piece of orange, he was seized by one of the spasms, and when Dr. Smith arrived on the spot was almost gone. The piece of orange which had stuck in his throat being removed, as a last resort the wind-pipe was severed, but to no purpose, as in a moment afterwards the young man went into a precocious condition, and it is not known what effect this catastrophe will exercise upon his weakened system. Much sympathy is felt and expressed for the bereaved family.—Digby Courier.

The Springhill and Parrsboro' Railway, 27 miles in length, is now almost completed, the Sackville "Post" says, and will shortly be in a position to carry coals from the Springhill Mines to the Bay of Minas for shipment. The grading of the line was finished some months ago, and the work of track laying and ballasting was commenced late last autumn by Mr. E. A. Kilian. Track laying is now complete with the exception of sidings. The terminus of the railway is at Whitehall Creek, nearly a mile beyond Parrsboro'. The creek is navigable for vessels of 300, 400 and 500 tons, and three wharves are to be built, 100 feet in length and 25 feet wide, to give facilities for loading three vessels at the same time. A great advantage that Parrsboro' possesses for the shipment of coal is that the harbor is open through the winter. The station house in Parrsboro' will be on Spring street, immediately adjoining the wharves. Rolling stock from the Pittsburg Car Company has been ordered, and by the 1st of April there will be ready 100 coal cars; 20 freight cars, 1 first class car, baggage and mail car. A Baldwin engine has also been ordered. The stations on the railway will be named Macan, Lawrence, Southampton, Westbrook, Jeffers, Leaks, Parrsboro' and Whitehall. Besides the great coal business that will be carried on over the railway, there are prospects that the construction of the line will also be the means of building up quite a lumber business.—Chronicle.

THE EASTERN QUESTION AND BRITISH COMMERCE.

The hostile attitude of Russia and Turkey toward each other has recently caused the English papers to compare the commerce between Great Britain and these two nations, and to speculate as to the probable effect which the success of the present power, in case of war, would have upon English trade. Though Turkey allows free trade and Russia has a protective system, the trade between and Russia with Turkey have been stationary, while with Russia they have increased 45 per cent. The increase in exports to Russia during the past ten years has been 175 per cent, while those to Turkey have increased only 4 per cent. The above estimate refers to Turkey as a whole, but when Turkey in Europe alone is considered it is found that the export trade has diminished over one-fourth. In 1876 the number of vessels entered and cleared between British and Russian ports was 7,360 with a tonnage of 2,643,766, while the figures for the Turkish Empire in the same year showed 835 vessels, with a tonnage of 550,448. It is concluded from this that the Turkish nominally free-trade policy has no conception of a liberal commercial policy, and that, if the present state of mal-administration is continued, the English trade will be long before it is likely to show any sympathy in commercial circles.—Boston Journal.

THE PETTS COVE COPPER MINES.

FIVE CHILDREN AND A MAN KILLED BY A ROCK FROM THE ST. JOHN'S CHURCH, OF MARCH, 1744.

A sad accident happened during a severe storm, by which a large mass of rock was detached from the summit of a hill, and, sweeping downward, completely buried two houses. Sad to relate five children were taken out dead, from among the ruins, and one man was severely injured. So soon as the alarm was given, every effort was made to rescue those in peril, and with the exceptions named above all were saved. Mr. Robinson was himself one of the spot directing operations, and the utmost kindness and attention was shown to all the sufferers. The houses destroyed contained over thirty-five inhabitants.

A TIGER FIGHT.

A very large royal Bengal tiger, says the Bengal Times, measuring about eleven feet from tip to tail, was killed some time ago by a man named "Biggame". It appears that some sports were cutting down in a field, when the brute attacked one of them, seizing hold of his neck and increasing the tension and nerves. One of his companions was then attacked, and his bowels were torn open. A third man's shoulder was smashed, and two others were severely wounded before the alarm could be given in the village. A party was immediately formed, headed by a young man, and when they approached the tiger the frocious beast made a dash at him, but the leader, who carried a loaded double-barrelled gun, dexterously pulled the trigger. The first shot passed through the right eye of the animal, which, irritated as it now was, made another spring at its foe with its mouth wide open, and the second bullet, after knocking out one of its teeth, passed out through the back of its head. It now became infuriated, and made a third spring at the man, who, at its amputation being spent, rushed to the rescue of another man, who was being dragged from one of the trees, about through the heart, and the exciting scene was over. Two of the wounded men expired on their way to the St. John's Hospital, and a third has since died, and the remaining two are not expected to survive long. The immense size of the tiger created quite a sensation when it was brought to town. Naval-Addict Ghumany presented a tiger shikaree with a shawl in recognition of his bravery.

WASTE TOBACCO.

Tobacco is tolled at the Richmond Canning Company's bonded works in Livepool, to make a wash for sheep. As much as 28 cwt. has been boiled down on the premises in a single day, and on one occasion the Messrs. river authorities were put to much perplexity and trouble by the difficulty of sinking a mass of refuse which had been sent out to sea, and persisted in floating back with the incoming tide. There were about 50 tons of it, and it was passed before it could be induced to disappear. The decoction of tobacco is adulterated with sulphate of copper, turpentine, and salt, as soon as it cools and the exhausted leaf partially destroyed (denatured) with quicklime before leaving the boiling house, under the direction of the customs. This prevents the tobacco or the refuse from being used in tobacco manufacture afterwards. Each gallon of the sheep wash contains the essence of 24 ozs. of strong American leaf. The preparation, which is allowed to be sold free of duty, has found favor not only among breeders of sheep, but among agriculturalists and gardeners, as an effective vermin destroyer.—John Manning, in Journal of Applied Chemistry.

FALLING HAIR.

A correspondent of the "Medical and Surgical Reporter" asks: "What will prevent the falling of hair? I have used, for the past ten years, in my own case, and prescribed frequently for others, the following with full satisfaction: Glycerine and tincture capivi, each 2 ozs., oil of bergamot, 1 drachm; mix and perfume to suit. This is to be the only dressing for the hair. Wash the head occasionally with soft water and fine soap.

PROVINCIAL FINANCES.

There are no less than one hundred and sixty different religious denominations in the United States. If a man weigh one hundred and fifty-four pounds, one hundred and eleven pounds of that weight will be water. THRILLING SCENE IN A DEPOT.

The Poughkeepsie Eagle has the following account of a narrow escape from death by several persons at Fishkill Landing depot, Wednesday morning. "The upward bound passenger train, which was late at the depot, and had just started, and 40 or 50 passengers had started to get on and off when the St. Louis Express, bound south, and which does not stop at Fishkill Landing, came thundering around the curve just behind the station. No alarm of the approach of the train had been given. It was behind time, and running at the rate of 40 miles an hour. Its track crossed the track of the regular train, and the men who saw the train coming ran shouting in every direction, women screamed and cried for help, and bystanders turned their heads, fearing to see at least a dozen persons cut to pieces. One or two women grasped the iron railing attached to the platforms of the train and faintly as the men crowded them as close to the train as they could get, a lady, Mrs. Frank Browne, of Newburgh, was crossing the track to get on the up train, but when she reached the centre of the track she was struck by the express. With great presence of mind she turned and ran back as the train thundered by, the pilot of the engine just missing her dress. Men on the west side of the railway, seeing the woman in peril, ran to her aid, as they expected that the people who were clinging to the railing of the upward-bound train had been drawn by the passing express. Luckily no one was hurt."

THE TRUFFLE.

The truffle is a species of underground fungus largely used in French cookery to give a peculiar rich flavor to meats. It comes principally from France, where it is cultivated in a peculiar manner, and can only be gathered through the agency of the keen scent of dogs or pigs especially trained to hunt for it. Both from the fact of its being a parasite, and from the fact that it is a delicacy highly prized by epicures, it brings in all markets a large price; and this truffle hunting has long been a regular and profitable industry in France and Italian peninsula. In appearance, the truffle is a blackish mass, covered with protuberances and weighing from an ounce to several pounds; when cut open it presents a mottled appearance, and its reproductive portion (it is sessile) is found in the veins in the shape of minute sacs which never open, each containing a few spores, possessing spine-covered or honeycombed surfaces.—Scientific American.
