Barred to Death.

One of the most heartrending scenes ever witnessed in any civilized community occurred in Mortier Bay Saturday night, says the St. John Telegram. The mother fastened the door with the outside and went to visit at King's, about a hundred yards distant. When the neighbors were rushing towards the site they found her frantic and desperate cries of the poor little child in the endeavor to escape from the burning building. The body of the eldest, a boy, was found near the kitchen door, thereby showing that the poor little fellow had been going out to the door made his way through the bedroom into the kitchen, only to find himself imprisoned in a living cage. The body of the other was found under the stove. The mother appears to be one of criminal negligence.
