the police training school under the auspices of the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE). There are currently 80 Canadian police officers in Kosovo.

- Canada has provided \$36 million for humanitarian assistance,
 \$45.5 million toward promoting a secure environment, and \$10 million in the form of economic assistance.
- Canada has contributed \$19 million to community-based rehabilitation. Of this, \$8 million is used for a teacher training project to develop tolerance, human rights and democracy among Kosovar youth.

Former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia

- NATO has stepped up its efforts within Kosovo and has increased cooperation with the Former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia (FYROM). It has also appointed a permanent ambassador to Skopje.
- NATO provides military advice to the FYROM government under the Partnership for Peace program.
- Some 4,500 NATO logistics troops are in FYROM to provide humanitarian aid and support NATO-led forces in Kosovo.
- Through CIDA, Canada has provided \$5.7 million in assistance to FYROM since the Kosovo crisis, largely to support economic reform and small democratization initiatives.
- CIDA is looking at additional funding to support projects that will improve the inter-ethnic situation in FYROM.

Federal Republic of Yugoslavia

- Canada has provided about \$40 million in assistance for the Federal Republic of Yugoslavia since January 1999. Most sanctions have been effectively lifted since the change in regime in October 2000. Exceptions are the arms sale ban and sanctions against the ex-President and officials of the previous regime.
- Canada intends to continue assisting democratic transition in the Federal Republic of Yugoslavia, while continuing to call for full co-operation with the International Criminal Tribunal for the Former Yugoslavia and other obligations under UN resolution 1244.
