SHOT HE BELLIGHT TO WORK OF HE COLUMN TO COME TO THE SECOND It is nearly six years since the Unemployment Insurance Act came into operation on July 1st, 1941. Since that time up to the end of 1946, total revenues from the joint contribution of employers, employees, and the Federal Government, amount to \$427,374,298. To the workers earning more than \$2400 a year are not covered under Unemployment Insurance. Nor are workers in certain specified industries or occupations such as agriculture, forestry, fishing.

While the introduction of Unemployment Insurance was undoubtedly age major step in progressive social legislation, the Canadian Government recd the necessities for extending the benefit to include workers who are not & present covered by its terms. I will refer later to the Government's objection in this direction.
