The Secretary of State for External Affairs has announced that Canada will be hosting the Second Session of the Intergovernmental Working Group on Marine Pollution, which is preparing for the United Nations Conference on the Human Environment to be held in Stockholm in June, 1972. As a state with one of the longest coastlines in the world, Canada has participated actively in all international efforts to prevent and control marine pollution and to develop an effective system of international environmental law.

The Honourable Jack Davis, Minister of the Environment will address the meeting at its opening session on Monday, November 8.
