Mr. PELLETIER:

1. 29th August, 1907, under the late Government, presumably for political reasons.

2. The population of St. Hyacinthe was 9,500, and the villages of St. Joseph de Hyacinthe and La Providence, both of which are in the area to which the letter carrier service was given, had a population of 1,500 and 1,000 respectively, making the total 12,000.

3. The revenue of St. Hyacinthe was \$10,799.91 and that of St. Joseph de Hyacinthe \$346.80, making a total of \$11,146.71. There was no post office in the village of La Providence; the residents used the St. Hyacinthe post office.

4. The population of St. Hyacinthe was 9,797 and that of St. Joseph de Hyacinthe and La Providence 514 and 894 respectively, making a total of 11,205.
