If government members resent this type of thing, then methinks they do protest too much.

What are the criteria for acceptance of programs? I submit that there never has been a clear definition of the criteria. On one occasion the government said that the regional unemployment situation was to be used as a measure. Another time, in answer to a question, we were told that the financial need of the student has not been used as a specific criterion for approval. Is there an equal division of money among the provinces on a per capita basis according to the number that will be employed? I do not think so. Ontario has 34.78 per cent of the population of Canada. I thank the Minister without Portfolio (Mr. Stanbury) because this information came from his department today in answer to a simple telephone call. So far, this province has received \$3.43 million out of the \$14 million that has been spent, so it is definitely not allocated on a per capita basis because other provinces have received considerably more.

Why has the idea of profit making been so arbitrarily dismissed? Surely, there are some ventures in which this could and would provide a healthy motivation. Who in his right mind would suggest that none of these projects should be profit oriented? Who says that industry could not stand the competition? Who says that industry would not welcome competition in worthwhile projects? Industry has offered to co-operate, and later I will cite some examples. I thought the programs should have been designed to supply opportunities so that in the fall students would have a few bucks in their hot little hands to give the registrar at a university. But no, this program evidently, from the evidence that I can gather, is designed for self expression. That is the thrust of this
