Our emphasis on partnerships is also apparent every fall during Canada Career Week. Special events organized across the country, with the co-operation of Canada Employment Centres, schools and business, give young people a chance to find out more about various occupations and think about their career choices. This fall, Canada Career Week will focus on younger students and urge them to start thinking about their careers.

Furthermore, Mr. Speaker, the hon. member for Welland—St. Catharines—Thorold knows as well as we do that Canada can no longer count on human resources alone to make its economy prosper. In the last Speech from the Throne, the government clearly indicated that in a global economy, prosperity depends increasingly on knowledge, skills and innovation. That is why we emphasize up—dating skills so that young Canadians can develop and diversify our economy and give us a head start on world markets. Business, unions and governments are invited to work together to create at least 2.5 million new jobs by the year 2000 and to increase the real income of Canadians by at least 25 per cent.

Mr. Speaker, these objectives are realistic, but our young people will have the difficult task of achieving them. I want to give the hon. member the assurance that through the programs and initiatives I just described, this government, in co-operation with its partners in Montreal, Quebec and Canada as a whole, is trying to transform a national co-operative effort into effective local action. We are doing everything we can to provide a brilliant future for young Canadians, and we mean all young Canadians.

in school issues in my riding gets a copy of this historic speech.

Mr. Speaker, in the discharge of my duties over the past seven years, I have often met people, men and women, who were looking for a job, either because they had lost their job or wanted a change. In every case, I did the same thing. I tried to make them realize that nobody is in a better position than they are to help them find a job. As the saying goes: "God helps those who help themselves." I noticed that they do not always give themselves every chance of succeeding. That is when I believe my advice can be the useful and, to sum it up, Mr. Speaker, my advice is this: first, identify the position that suits you before applying; concentrate on employers in the chosen field; apply in person; preferably, have a clear and up to date résumé; finally, take great care over your presentation at the time of the interview.

These constitute, Mr. Speaker, the ABC of success in job hunting. In my experience, a highly motivated person almost always finds work within a reasonable time, provided of course that person puts in the time and energy required and does not rely exclusively on others to do it for him or her.
