Dear Mr. Wright,

Your letter of April 18th was a very pleasant surprise since I had not expected to hear so soon, but I am delighted to know that the Bretton Woods address was of some help to you. On the other matters that you mention I shall have to wait until either I reach Halifax or you reach Montreal, but I hope that one or other of these possibilities will occur in the not too distant future.

As to the international trade situation, my own feeling, as you may have gathered from some of my earlier remarks, is that we are doing a pretty fair job in the exploration of markets for Canadian exports, but we have scarcely begun to study the reciprocal question of the extent to which Canada is willing and able to receive goods exported by other countries. That to me is the knub of the question and quite frankly, I could wish that all of the important countries would spend a good deal of time studying the question of increasing the volume of their imports since I do not see any other way in which international trade is substantially to be increased.
