In Magog, where I am able more conveniently to oversee the work and consult with the teachers, a good school of thirty has risen from a very small beginning.

Whooping-cough has greatly thinned our numbers at

Georgeville for two months past.

In the schools a very lively interest has been taken.

The Christmas tree at Georgeville was a great success, 200 or more assembling on the occasion, and 150 remaining

to close a harry day in church.

Through the kindness of two brother clergy, the "Magic Lantern" was shown in both villages; at Georgeville by Rev. A. Stevens of Dixville, and at Magog by Prof. Roe of Lennoxville.

The annual Sunday School pic-nie was on a larger scale than usual, the Revds. Clayton and Kittson (my neighbours in the Diocese of Montreal) bringing their schools together, and all going on board the "Lady of the Lake" to Owl's Head.

Mrs. LaFrenaye gave an additional treat to the children

of Magog in the grove by her residence.

The need of a Sunday School library was sorely felt, and Mr. Webster, of Magog, very generously began a subscription with \$10, which was supplemented to the amount of \$37.22, and with this a very respectable library was bought.

The ladies of Georgeville formed themselves into a Society of workers for the Church, making articles for a Bazaar in the summer, giving entertainments on a small scale each fortnight, thus bringing in about \$100. Also in the summer, through the invitation of certain friends in Georgeville, the young ladies and gentlemen of Stanstead came over and gave a concert (interspersed with readings) which brought in \$50 more.

The Magog ladies are now working for a similar object. The Mission was honored by the Governor-General and Lady Dufferin spending the Sunday in it, and attending the Parish Church. On that occasion Bishop Niles, of New Hampshire, kindly assisted by preaching, and there being a great assembly, did much to strengthen the Church in

these parts.

His Lordship spent three days in the Mission, confirming in the two centres 14, and at a private house 2—16.
