to act against the other. Was there only one Power, then they would be dependent, as the Means of carrying on War would be in the Hands of that Power alone.

But as their Ability of effecting so great a Work must appear incredible, or, indeed, in the highest Degree absurd to an European Ear, he, in some Meafure, arms himself against the Imputation of Extravagance, by explaining the Circumstances in which the Superiority of the Savages over a civilized and fettled Race of Men consists, viz. Their amazing Hardiness of Constitution; their Patience and Perseverance; their excellent Cunning, and inimitable Swiftness; the irrefiftible Nature and Force of their Attacks; their Security from being attacked; but above all, the invincible Advantage which a People who subsit entirely on Hunting and Shooting, must have over those
