EXHIBITION WORK WELL UNDER WAY

Grounds Commence to Take on Appearance of Great Activity.

MANY IMPROVEMENTS

Illuminative Scheme and Decoration Throat is On a Bigger Scale.

Under the careful supervision of Percy Mackie, grounds engineer of the Canadian National Exhibition, every-

thing is being made ready for Toronto's great annual event, which is only a little more than two weeks away.

The lawns are in splendid condition, having been mowed con-

siderably by the heavy showers, and the array of flowers is simply magnific-

ent. Since the soldiers were camped on the grounds, traces of their presence have been removed; the buildings have

been most carefully cleaned and in places reconstructed, and also the cost of repairing the damage done

to the neighborhood of \$20,000, all the work is of a permanent nature,

despite the fact that the grounds will be used by the militia after the fair is over.

An interesting new feature is the artificial moon, which will illuminate the outdoor agricultural section.

It consists of a huge wooden ball some eight feet in diameter, studded with 1800 electric bulbs, and is mounted on a structural steel column some 30 feet high.

When lighted up will have the appearance of hanging in space, as the supporting column will be invisible.

The damage done by target practice under the east end of the grand stand has been completely obliterated and fifty-five new booths have been added.

The stables for show cattle are being scrubbed and made scrupulously clean. Forty men are at work disin-

fecting the stables thorough. The sheep, dog and poultry buildings are being treated in the same way.

30,000 Electric Lights. At night a blaze of illumination will burst forth, the like of which has never been seen on the grounds.

Altogether there will be about 30,000 lights. Running from the north gate around the plaza to the live stock section there will be a line of 6000 many colored lights. This is entirely a new feature.

On the manufacturers' building the flags of the allies will be shown in electric lights in their true colors, and flag poles throughout the grounds will be topped by high candle-power nitro-

gen lamps. Special illumination has been arranged for the Gooderham fountain. Submerged reflectors will alternate in throwing the most beautiful colors up from the water's depths.

Elaborate Exhibit. The exhibit of the Dominion Government will be more elaborate than ever. Many beautiful decorations are being added to the interior of the transportation building and exhibition, showing a tendency to go in for more illumination and decoration on their own account.
