## The Western Canada Irrigation Association.

The Twelfth Annual Convention of this Association held at Nelson, B.C., on July 24, 25 and 26, 1918, attracted a large number to its sessions. The Local Board of Control left nothing to be desired in the manner in which they looked after the comfort and entertainment of the delegates and visitors.

A number of well prepared and instructive papers were read and the discussions which followed certain topics have no doubt already proved their value.

- (5) The Measurement of Water by Dr. Samuel Fortier, Berkeley, Calif.
- (6) Irrigation by Pumping by Jas. J. Currie, Staff Engineer, Military Hospital, Balfour, B.C.

The report of Mr. Stead, Acting-Secretary, reviewed the work of the Association from the time of the Convention at Maple Creek and shows that the interests of the Association are being well looked after. A portion of Mr. Stead's report is quoted below:—
