out breeches, and a tomakaw by my side. In about two days they became sociable. Having visited three or four other families, at the distance of 16 or 20 miles, 1 got them together to prayer on the Sabbath days, to the number of 17 persons. I staid with them six weeks; and they expressed much sorrow when I left them. I was now one hundred and twelve miles from home. On the road I sometimes met with a house, then I was hospitably entertained; and when I met with none. a tree lent me the use of its friendly shelter and protection, from the prowling beasts of the woods during the night. The God of mercy and grace supported methus for eight days, and on the winth F reached my'uncle's house. The following particulars, relating to the manner in which I was made known to my family, are less interesting; and yet, perhaps, rome readers would not forgive their omission : I shall, however, be as brief as I can. I asked my uncle for: a lodging, which he refused. I enquired how far the town was off; three quarters of a mile, said he. Do you know Mrs.
