The Revolutionist Outbreak is Quelled There is Possibility of Renewed Slaughter—General Strike in Poland is Spreading—The Railways are Still Running.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 25.—To-day's news from Russian Poland indicates that the general strike is extending. Wholesale arrests have been made in the cities. At Somovice, near the emperor's hunting lodge, an attempt has been made to blow up the barracks with dynamite.

From many places come reports that the enraged people are threatening the strikers and revolutionists with violence and massacres on a large scale are feared. At Moscow the parties of law and order, the progressive, except those at Mittan and Liban, have been driven out of province.

During the debate M. Guchkov, a prominent member of the Conservative party of Moscow, spoke in justification of the course of the government, which he declared was not crushing liberty, but putting down anarchy.

M. Shmakoff, the noted reactionist, made a sensational speech in which he declared that the revolutionists are not only attacking the Jews but also the Russian people would not grant the Jews equal rights.

The principal danger now seems to be the "Black Legion" which is completing the work begun by the troops and end the revolt with a horrible massacre.

Four thousand strikers marched out of Moscow and completely destroyed the railway lines between St. Petersburg and Moscow.

Security continued buoyant on the bourse to-day, imperial bonds were at 100, and the market was buoyant.

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AN EX-DIRECTOR CHARGES

SAYS PHILLIPS SHARED PROFITS

PEOPLE HE NAMES DEIFY

R. H. Sanderson Says He Wanted President Stopped From Getting Orders on the Treasurer — Auditors Who Didn't Audit and Reports Which Were Disputed.

"I will make an ad interim report to the attorney-general as soon as possible," said Commissioner H. Cross when adjourning the York Loan enquiry at 6 o'clock last night. He thanked Home Smith, acting for the liquidator, for assistance and the witnesses for the frank manner which had characterized their evidence.

The purpose of his report was outlined in yesterday's World.

The closing session of the enquiry was featured by the charges of ex-inspector Sanderson, who gave evidence implicating Mr. Phillips and others in sharp transactions, but it was all entirely settled on each before the commissioner.

There are some auditors who are not auditing people to give them money, saying they represent the York Loan, but they are not auditing the liquidator, but send in your pass books and help us to get this mess straightened out.

Hon. Colin Campbell, attorney-general of Manitoba, called during the afternoon and shook hands with Mr. Cross. He simply stated that he had nothing to say, except that it was a relief, and some of his acquaintances were absent.

Mr. Phillips, who is the vice-president of Mr. Phillips Southern Power and Light Co., was the star witness of the morning. He took the oath and he believed in his success. The agreement on which the York Loan enquiry was based was made between Joseph Barrett, Emily A. Barrett and Joseph Phillips. He was a good witness.

His salary had recently been increased from \$10 to \$20. His yearly salary was a good deal more than sixteen half days per annum. He understood there was a deal of money in the York Loan, and that the mortgage had been restituted.

He had found cause where there were no securities for instance the Southern Power and Light Co. It was just explained to him that there were bonds.
