**HAPPENINGS IN HAMILTON HEALTH PROMOTERS AGREE**

**Come to Agreement Over Dispensary and Nurse Disputes—Sherring at School Games.**

Hamilton, May 31.—(Special.)—There has been a little friction between the Hamilton Health Association and the Board of Health. The Mayor called both Boards together this evening. It was agreed to follow the Board of Health's advice and establish the dispensary in connection with the city hospital. The Assn. will engage a nurse to look after the advanced cases. Dr. Roberts, the Medical Health Officer, criticized the Assn. for not making advanced cases their first care. They had a good bargain with the Gravenhurst Sanitarium, and could get its incident cases looked after much cheaper there. It was agreed that a member of the Board of Health should be admitted to the directorate of the Assn. The Association will not go in for any building operations this year, but will get a supply of shacks up once.

The Highfield school games were held this afternoon at the cricket grounds. William Sherring acted umpire. The prizes were presented by Mrs. Dumoulin and Mrs. Malloch. William Gartshore won the senior championship, and with the Bristol and Staunton cups; and Gordon C. Ferrie the junior championship and the Taylor cup.

Chatham, May 31.—The best sugar bylaw, voted on to-day, resulted in the defeat of the bylaw by 47 majority. The total vote was 483 for and 510 against.

**GROCERS' GUILD ON TRIAL STARTLING CHARGES MADE**

**Merchants Relate How They Have Been Unable to Procure Supplies.**

Hamilton, May 31.—(Special.)—The case against the Wholesale Grocers' Guild, on the charge of conspiracy, was continued this morning in police court before Magistrate Mills and Crown Attorney Washington obtained evidence against the alleged combine of a highly sensational character. Letters were submitted which showed that the guild had what it called an equalized sugar freight rate, which was higher in many instances than the rates of the railroads, from whom the refiners got their difference in the form of rebates. Whether the guild got anything out of the rebate has not been shown yet. It was shown that two grocers, Andrew McBean of Kingston and John Curtis of Fort Hope, could not buy tobacco, sugar, syrup, starch or salt from the manufacturers or guild except at the retail rates.

The first witness called by Mr. Washington was Andrew McBean, Kingston, a grocer, carrying on both a retail and wholesale trade. "After working like a slave for over 40 years, the guild has kept me from occupying the place that I think I am entitled to; that's what the guild has done for me," Mr. McBean complained bitterly.

Mr. McBean told the court that he started business in 1851. In 1888, though his credit was good, he could not buy the sugar and tobacco direct from the manufacturers. In that year Sir William Macdonald, Montreal, wrote, refusing to sell him tobacco. Mr. Stewart, Mr. Macdonald's later agent, Mr. McBean complained made against him. Mr. Macdonald later informed Mr. McBean that he would sell him tobacco if he would re-sell it at the same price as other merchants, and Mr. McBean was able to get goods until 1890, when he was cut off altogether. He sold at three cents a pound lower than other dealers.

**Barred From Guild.**  
As to sugar, Mr. McBean said he was refused by the refiners in 1887. He was refused goods because he was not a member of the guild, and the guild was driven to make an effort to get into the guild, he was refused admission. He could not buy rice either, and he thought if he could get into the guild, he would be able to get into the guild. John Curtis, Fort Hope, another retailer and wholesaler, had a similar story to tell. Owing to the guild's invention of equalized rates on sugar, the price of sugar was kept up. According to this tariff, the G. T. R. freight rate from Montreal to Fort Hope was 14 cts. a hundred, and the boat rate 9 cts. a hundred. It is expected that a hundred guild placed a rate of 22 cts. a hundred on it in less than carload lots, and 15 cts. for carlots. The refiners' rates between Montreal and Hamilton, almost twice the distance, were less than carlots, only 9 cts. for carlots. Letters submitted showed that the refiners got a rebate of the difference between their rates and the railway rates.


**Supplies Refused.**  
Mr. Curtis could not get tobacco, starch, syrup or salt from the manufacturers except at retail rates. This might have been because he carried on a retail business as well as a wholesale trade.

Alfred Powis, local agent of the Macdonald Tobacco Company, and the Arcadia Sugar Company, was a very unwilling witness. He reluctantly admitted that he had refused to sell to non-members of the guild, and could not sell to those outside that body. The Wholesale Grocers' Company, a company that did not belong to the guild.

The case will be continued to-morrow in police court, and will be adjourned in the afternoon until the end of June.
