Frank McCarthy, the Malden, Mass., Athlete, captures the College Championship.

The 6th of May is ever a gala day on the St. Michael's College campus, where one hundred and fifty young athletes try their strength and skill. Yesterday the weather was fine, and together with an almost unusual amount of enthusiasm the conditions were perfect. The 8-st all-round athlete proved to be Mr. Francis McCarthy, who piled up 28 points, while Mr. M. Gibson, the second, scored 18. The champion was a speedy runner and in his home, steeplechase, has acquired quite a reputation in athletic circles. Among the juniors several hot contests took place, and the hundred-yard dash resulted in three dead heats for Boucher and Dooley, who share equally for the prize. Gossip of All Classes Versed in the Manly Art of Self-Defense—Past and Future Matches.

The match maker at the Toronto Athletic Club is getting together several good men for the boxing tournament Saturday, May 28th.

Billy Lambert has backed out of his proposed match with George Kerwin, the "mystery." The pair were to have boxed 15 rounds at South Omaha this month.

Jim Popp, the Canadian lightweight, will box 15 rounds with Jack Bennett at Toronto on May 21. Frank Hine expects to have a return match with Popp in Buffalo before long.—Buffalo Express.

After considerable squabbling and correspondence Peter Maher's desire for a \$10,000 purse to meet either Tom Sharkey or Jim Jeffries has been gratified. Yesterday Tom O'Rourke received articles of agreement, signed by Maher's managers. They call for a 20-round contest.

Kid McFarland wants to dispel the impression that he cannot reduce his weight as 125 pounds. The Kid yesterday posted \$250 to meet a match with Sully Sullivan at the lightweight limit. Failing in this, McFarland states that he will meet any man in his class in the first New York Sun.

The articles for the Popp-Bennett 15-round bout were received in the city yesterday from McKeesport, Pa., consigning the latter's signature. Bennett and his trainer, Barney Quinn, will arrive in Toronto on Friday, and they have asked the Crescent Athletic Club to select a quiet resort for training. The McKeesport reporter evidently recognizes that in the Canadian champion he will have one of the toughest propositions of his ring experience.

Jimmy Ryan of Australia and Jack McDonough of Chicago Tuesday night at Louisville fought 20 terrific rounds to a draw before 5000 sports gathered to attend the races. Both men were evenly matched, each landing numerous heavy blows, but neither being able to knock out.

In the second round McDonough had Ryan going, having landed three terrific blows, but Ryan came back and landed a knock-out. Ryan would have been sent to the floor by another blow had he not seized McDonough's right glove with both hands, holding it till the gong sounded and saved him.

The referee finally broke the grip with his weight. Again in the eighteenth round McDonough almost put Ryan out. In the 20th and last round McDonough was badly punished, but he stood it gamely and leaped nimbly over the ropes when the bout was declared a draw. Five hundred dollars was divided between the men. As Ryan did not win, it is not known whether Kid McCoy will meet him on the 11th, as was expected.

A Syracuse despatch says Tommy Ryan, the welterweight champion, will meet Gus Rubin in his coming fight with McCoy, and the reason for his doing so came about in a peculiar way. Rubin began to work about ten days ago, and Ryan started to train with Jack Hamilton. Yesterday he came over to Rubin's quarters and put on regular ring costume. He had on long pants and was told by Madden that Ryan would try to knock him out. They fought three rounds in a room fourteen feet square, and the bout was a good one, as they fought in training.

The onslaught surprised Rubin, but he came up and gave as good as he got. The second and third rounds were repetitions of the first, and Rubin landed left and right on body and jaw. Rubin's fighting back was with his hands. He was called to the ring and later that Rubin's eye was blacked and Ryan's nose badly hurt. Ryan and later that Rubin was at right, and had a good chance to win from McCoy. He showed him some of McCoy's points and as the result of the bout will be in Rubin's corner.
