SHEEHAN WAS DEAD.

Engineer on Lehigh Valley Rail- TORONTO HOUSE TO-NIGHT road Had His Head Crushed While at Work.

Binghamton, N.Y., Feb. 13 .- Martin C. Sheehan, an engineer on the Lehigh Valley Railroad, was found dying in his cab near Alpine, Pa., yesterday by his fireman, George F. Dodge.
