

# STOCK MARKET IS NARROW

Trading in C.P.R. and in Crow's Nest Coal

A flurry in the latter-Two City, Rapid Transit and Montreal Street Railway firms—Dull day on Wall Street—Money keeps Very Easy—Business failures—Bank Clearings—Notes.

World Office, Toronto, June 29. In Canadian securities today there was some dealing in C.P.R., which held about yesterday's figure. Crow's Nest Coal was rather active, advancing in the morning sharply to 135, and selling off in the afternoon to 130. Dominion Bank sold off at 254, and 255 for old shares. Montreal Street Railway and Two City advanced slightly, and Toronto Railway was about steady. The high price of pig stocks was dead. The Montreal and Toronto Exchange adjourned today till Tuesday, July 2.

R. G. Dun & Co. report the total business failures in Canada for the week ending June 28 as 21, against 20 the previous week and 23 the corresponding week of 1899. They give the following list of failures: Ontario, 10; Quebec, 4; British Columbia, 3; New Brunswick, 1; Nova Scotia, 1; Manitoba, 1; Saskatchewan, 1; Alberta, 1; S. D., 1; N. The aggregate bank clearings in the Dominion for the week ending June 28, 1900, were \$1,450,700, against \$1,450,700 the previous week and \$1,450,700 the corresponding week of 1899.

Consols declined 1/4 of 1% in London today. Amount of bullion withdrawn from the Bank of England on balance to-day, £20,000.

On Wall Street, it took about five minutes of trading after the opening of the exchange this morning to demonstrate the disinclination of stocks to continue the advance, which showed the ropes of the bulls yesterday. The market started off with a great show of animation and a semblance of strength. Prices of American securities were generally higher, but whether this symptom was the result of operations by cable from this side is open to question.

It is expected the banks will show a small profit in cash in connection with the statement, the estimated receipts from the interior not being sufficient to cover the requirements of the business. But as last week's unexpectedly large decrease in reserves is supposed to have anticipated the requirements for Monday's payment into the sub-treasury of the cash for the redemption of the bonds, it is possible that this week's official statement will show a small profit in cash.

The money market continued surprisingly quiet up to the close, considering that it is properly the time for the semi-annual dividends and interest, which is the largest in the history of the country.
