Promises All Sorts of Reforms for Armenia.

Lord Lansdowne's Statement Regarding Britain's Claims.

Frenchmen Give Utterance to Their Love for Russia.

Election Riots in Hungary—A Soldier Killed and Several Civilians Wounded—Cubans Defeated.

THE CABLE COMMISSION. London, Oct. 28.—The Pacific Cable Commission has been summoned to meet Nov. 9.

REBELS PUNISHED. Lisbon, Oct. 28.—A telegram received here from St. Paul de Loanda, Portuguese West Africa, says that the Portuguese expedition has just punished the rebellious Bendo natives. They burned four of their villages, killing 100 of the rebels.

AFTER FOUR DAYS' FIGHTING. Madrid, Oct. 28.—The Havana correspondent of the Imparcial telegraphs that Col. Segura, after four days' fighting in the hills in the Pinar del Rio Province, has defeated the rebels. Col. Segura found 61 of the enemy dead on the field. The Spanish lost 21 killed and 110 wounded. Maceo is now between the hills and the Trocha.

HONEYMOON AMUSEMENT. Rome, Oct. 28.—The Prince of Naples and his bride, Princess Helene of Montenegro, were present at a review of 17,000 troops on the parade grounds. The weather was bright and sunny, and the arrangements for the review were perfect. An immense crowd of people witnessed the movements of the troops.

RIOTS IN HUNGARY. Buda-Pesth, Oct. 28.—Serious election riots have taken place in different parts of Hungary. At Tynau a detachment of Hussars, while attempting to restore order, were stoned by the mob, and one trooper was killed. The Hussars thereupon charged with drawn swords, and several of the rioters were wounded. Troops have been sent to the various disturbed districts.

THE TUPPER CONVENTION. London, Oct. 28.—The Times, in commenting on a letter from Mr. Moreton Frewen, dated at Chicago, expressing confidence in Mr. Bryan's election, says: "The most serious factor in the prominence which Mr. Bryan has given to the Socialist side of his policy. The victory of these doctrines would be fatal to all confidence. Mr. Bryan's return to the White House, not only to America, but to all the civilized world, even though the victory might not be immediate, would be a disaster. Americans will choose the better part, though we do not look forward with much confidence to the policy of McKinley's Government, if he is elected."

London, Oct. 28.—The Chronicle's New York correspondent cables that the House of Representatives is buying votes in the States at \$10 apiece.

FAIR PROMISES. A cablegram to Washington says: The Porte has notified the signatory powers that it intends to execute to the reforms embraced in the Berlin Treaty. The measures to be adopted it is learned will carry the reforms into effect in the six provinces of Turkey contemplated by the treaty, and will embrace the entire empire.

The authorities at Constantinople have taken steps to counteract the public disfavor against Turkey due, it is said, to a lack of knowledge of the conditions. It is pointed out that the Armenian subjects of the Sultan have retained their nationality, their religion and their wealth for the last 600 years, under the protection of the Ottoman Empire, and that in no other country have the Armenians been protected in this independent exercise of all their rights and privileges.

The fact that troubles have occurred at Constantinople and elsewhere is not denied by the authorities, and they have just appointed a commission there to try and punish the guilty without discrimination. The commission is composed of the most prominent officers of the army and from civil stations.

The entire purpose of the authorities is to pursue such a policy as will restore peace and quiet to the disturbed country, and at the same time commend itself to all countries as just and humane. It is said that the Armenians themselves have stood in the way of the execution of the reforms under the Berlin treaty by bringing such turmoil on the country that any large measure of administration was made impossible.

RUSSIA'S FOREIGN RELATIONS. London, Oct. 28.—The Pesther Lloyd publishes an interview with M. Pobedonostzeff, Procurator-General of the Holy Synod of Russia, who is returning to St. Petersburg from Italy, and who stopped in Vienna en route. He said there could not be a real alliance between Russia and Germany, there were merely friendly relations between the two countries. This was the general view of the views of all the leading statesmen.

M. Pobedonostzeff added: "We thanked the Almighty and were happy when the Emperor left France, as we were in perpetual anxiety. The French cannot be entirely depended upon. Russia is in a position of a close alliance with France, and the German Emperor is well aware of that fact. What the Czar and all other Russians chiefly desire is peace."

The Berlin Reichsanzeiger, the German official journal, declares that the Government has no intention to clear up the so-called revelations of the Hamburger Nachrichten, Prince Bismarck's personal organ, which allege

that Germany, from 1884 to 1890, had a secret understanding with Russia, at variance with the terms of the Dreikaiserbund. "Germany's sincerity and fidelity to her treaties," the Reichsanzeiger says, "is only too firmly established to be shaken by such revelations."

For some reason the opinion is held in Government circles at Vienna that the article in the Hamburger Nachrichten alludes to the old Prussian-Russian treaty that was in effect long previous to the formation of the Triple Alliance. This treaty has never been formally canceled. Scarcely an expression in Berlin political circles and in most of the newspapers regarding the truth of the Hamburger Nachrichten's article. The official newspapers make no reference whatever to the story.

"WELED TOGETHER." Paris, Oct. 28.—The presidents of the two chambers, in their opening addresses, alluded in strong and sympathetic terms to the recent visit of the Czar and Czarina to France.

The President of the Chamber of Deputies, M. Brisson, after reading a letter from President France, giving the substance of the Czar's telegram to the chief magistrate of France on leaving that country, said that the Chamber of Deputies, in 1881, solemnly manifested France's sympathy with Russia, and he expressed himself as being certain that the present commission would decide in Great Britain's favor on the evidence. Lord Lansdowne declared that Sir Edward's statement was a startling and serious one. Great Britain's claims had been carefully investigated, and he believed that most of them could be supported by satisfactory evidence. Lord Lansdowne added that he had reason to hope that the time was approaching when these questions would be settled by arbitration or an amicable compromise upon suitable conditions.

When the time came Great Britain would enter court, not for a moment believing that every point would be settled in her favor, but confident that her claims would be found to be based upon the established principles of international law.
