THE DETROIT BONSPIEL.

Detroit, Jan. 12.—The second international curling bonspiel opened at Belle Isle yesterday afternoon. The ice was in fairly good shape, although not as good as the curlers would wish for. The following rinks have arrived and registered: St. Marys, Toronto, Stratford, Grand Rapids, Sarnia, Forest, Chatham, Petrolia, Thamesville, Ridgeway, Embury, Glencoe and Windsor. Toledo is the only other city that is still expected, and it is possible that their rinks will arrive tomorrow. Still there are fifteen cities represented. The first drawing took place at noon and play started. The three trophies are being contested for are the Cadillac, Russell and Walker cups. Last year Ridgeway won the Russell House cup. This year for a single rink. This also holds the record for not having lost one game during the last bonspiel. Sarnia was a close second, and carried off the Cadillac. Detroit took the Walker cup. Interesting Information Brought Out at Tuesday's Meeting.

Of the East Middlesex Farmers' Institute Held in Harriestville—Clover Culture, Crop Rotation, Feed for Swine and Care of Milk Dealt With.

Harriestville, Jan. 12.—Mr. R. Venn, of Harriestville, occupied the chair at the Farmers' Institute meeting held here yesterday. There was a large number of the best poultry, and present. Among them were Messrs. H. Finch, Harriestville; A. A. Brodie, Louis Cooper, Gladstone; D. Duncan, McLaughlin, Crampton; Jas. Gilmour, M.P., Nilestone; Geo. Neely, Dorchester Station; W. F. Scott, J. J. S. Cornish, Barr, S. Demertry, J. P. Beattie, Derwent; D. Smith, Wm. Clapton, Avon; F. J. York, P. H. Rickard, T. Bodway, T. H. Barr, J. H. O'Neill, Jas. Smith, Jas. Eaton, J. H. Scott, Harriestville. About 35 members for the Institute were present.

The subject of "Clover Culture and the Value of Humus in the Soil" was dealt with by Mr. A. Brodie, of Wilgrove, Ont., in a clear and intelligent manner, giving the most successful method of securing a catch, care in the growth, value as feed of the different clovers, and also explaining how humus benefits the soil as a fertilizer, warms it, mechanical action, power to hold manure and chemical action.

"Rotation of Crops" was the basis of a scientific and thoroughly instructive paper by Mr. A. A. Brodie, of Harriestville.

The secretary had with him a portion of Mr. Baty's home-made lightning-rod, and gave a synopsis of his address at Thorndale, answering all questions concerning it. This was exceedingly well received.

Mr. W. C. Shearer, Bright, gave a paper on "Raising and Feeding Swine," dealing with the various points of feeding, piglets, roots, boiled and steamed, and thus, with skim milk, led to pig in the middle field. THE WORLD'S RECORDS.

Baltimore, Md., Jan. 1.—Chairman Mott, of the L. N. W. racing track, has received a letter from Henry Sturmy, of Coventry, England, secretary of the International Cyclists' Union, stating that there are no official world records. Mr. Mott began an investigation of the matter at the time Ed. McCaffrey, of Boston, tried to set a record on the Willow Grove track at Philadelphia. McCaffrey's remuneration depended on whether he set a world record in breaking or equalizing the world's records. He did some remarkable riding, tying clocks of England, at 1:35 2-5 for a mile. Several of the records were clipped. Then McCaffrey claimed pay for the world's records. Mott allowed the records and recorded them as official within the jurisdiction of the L. N. W. He believed them to be world records, but he had no documents in his office to sustain his belief, and wrote to Secretary Sturmy inquiring whether there was not some kind of setting the matter. Mr. Sturmy suggests that each organization send him its official records on Jan. 1 of each year. He will then compile them and send copies to racing board chairmen or similar officers throughout the world, so that each may decide for himself what are world's records.

LOOSE PEDALS.

Pedals very often work loose in their sockets through the wearing of the threads of the screw. The best way to overcome this is to wind the stem closely with coarse wire or darning wool. Then coat this with ordinary gun arabic. Screw on the nut as firmly as possible, and it will generally be found to hold securely.
