THE WORLD'S RECORDS. Baltimore, Md., Jan. 1 .- Chairman Mott, of the L. A. W. racing board, has received a letter from Henry Sturmey, of Coventry, England, secretary of the International Cyclists' Union, stating that there are no official world's racing records. Mr. Mott began an investigation of the matter at the time Edward McDuffie, of Boston, tried for re-cords on the Willow Grove track at Philadelphia. McDuffie's remuneration depended somewhat on whether he succeeded in breaking or equalizing the world's records. He did some remarkable riding, tieing Stocks, of England, at 1:35 2-5 for a mile. Several of the records were clipped. Then McDuffie claimed pay for the world's records. Mott allowed the records and recorded them as official within the jurisdiction of the L. A. W. He believed them to be world's records, but he had no documents in his office to sustain his belief, and wrote to Secretary Sturmey to inquire whether there was not some way of settling the matter. Mr. Sturmey suggests that each organization send him in its official records on Jan. 1 of each year. He will then compile them and send copies to racing board chairmen or similar officers throughout the world, so that each may decide for himself what are world's records.

On the Warpath!

Uprising of Indians in Oklahoma Twenty-Five Citizens of Pottawattamis County Massacred,

Dallas, Texas, Jan. 12.-A special from Oklahoma City, O. T., says: There is an uprising in the Seminole nation, and 100 armed Indians have killed 25 citizens of Pottawattamie county, this territory.

The Indians are seeking to avenge the recent burning of Lincoln Mc-Geisey and Palmer Simpson, two Indians of the Seminole tribe, who were accused of murdering and outraging Mrs. Leard, of Maud postoffice. A special trainload of armed citizens has by going to hear the evangelist at Delaware. Maud, and excitement is higher than ever before known in the Indian ter-

South McAlester, I. T., Jan. 12.-A telegram received here last evening by the train dispatcher of the Choctaw, Oklahoma and Gulf Railway, states that a band of 150 Seminole Indians is on the warpath, and is leaving behind it a trail of blood. A telegram was sent by the railroad station agent at Marlborough. The brief information conveyed was that the Seminoles were avenging the work of the mob of white men that burned the two Seminoles, and had already killed 25 men, women and children.

GENERAL UPRISING. Kansas City, Mo., Jan. 12 .- A special to the Times from Shawnee, O. T., says trains on the Choctaw branch of the Frisco Railroad have brought to this city every woman and child from Earlsboro, some 200 people, near the border of the Seminole nation. The burning at the stake of McGeisey and Simpson, the Seminole half-breeds, has so enraged the Seminoles that they have banded together and are raiding over the country around Maud and Wewka, in a wild rage, killing the stock. A party of 200 savages, halfbreeds and other toughs, rode into a Mrs. J. W. Woodhull. neighborhood eighteen miles south of Earlsboro, and began shooting through the doors and windows of a man who had recently come in from Ohio. Every person in the house is reported to be killed. The people who came in on the Mr. Jas. Laing has gone on a month's train from Earlsboro say that about 10 o'clock yesterday a regular pitched battle occurred, and that three families were killed. There is a general uprising. Messengers have been sent to the military station demanding immediate aid and protection.
