

HOSTILITIES TO CEASE BETWEEN POLES AND UKRAINIANS

Question of Ex-German Emperor's Transfer Concerns Only the Entente Nations and Germany, Claim Representatives of the Dutch Government.

The Hague, May 14.—The Dutch Government denies that it has decided to surrender former Emperor William. The question at present, it contends, concerns only Germany and the Entente.

AUSTRIA WILL
RECEIVE TERMS
IN FEW DAYS

Fewer Powers Will Be Represented Than Those That Appeared at Versailles.

MEET AT ST. GERMAIN

Nations That Declared War or Severed Diplomatic Relations To Be Represented.

Paris, May 14.—Belief that the peace treaty with Austria would be handed to the delegates of that nation by the end of the present week was expressed today.

It develops that the Allied powers to be represented at St. Germain in the negotiations with the Austrians will be less numerous than those at Versailles. These powers will comprise the states which declared war upon or broke diplomatic relations with Austria-Hungary.

COMMISSION WILL
DEAL WITH GERMAN
DELEGATES' NOTES

Special Body Appointed by the Council of Four To Hear Objections and Proposals.

Paris, May 14.—The council of four of the peace conference appointed this afternoon a subcommittee comprising one member from each of the five great powers (Great Britain, France, Italy, the United States and Japan) to deal with objections and proposals from the German peace plenipotentiaries.

BRITISH WANT SHIPS
DISTRIBUTED ON BASIS
OF TONNAGE LOSSES

Poland Submits Claim to Conference for Some of German-Surrendered Vessels.

Paris, May 14.—Renewed efforts are being made by the British delegation to secure an agreement calling for the pooling of former German merchant vessels and their distribution on a basis of tonnage loss during the war instead of the plan of the United States retaining those ships interned in America prior to that country entering the war.

CONDEMNES TERMS

ITALIAN TROOPS
BEING SENT TO
DALMATIA COAST

Ridges and Passes in Disputed Area Are Being Fortified.

OPPOSITE ANCONA

Soldiers Are Being Rapidly Moved To the East.

London, May 14.—The Italians are landing large military forces at Zara and Sebenico, on the coast of Dalmatia, according to a Reuters dispatch from Belgrade, the Serbian capital. The troops are being moved eastward and are fortifying the ridges and passes.

Zara and Sebenico are near the centre of the Dalmatian coast and are between Spalato and Trieste. They are opposite the Italian port of Ancona. The mountains to the east of the two ports are the Dinaric Alps.

Claims Prohibition
Will Mean Increase
in Drug Addicts

New York Justice Offers At Least Two "Antidotes."

New York, May 14.—Establishment of "drug dispensaries" and passage of a law providing for a liberal percentage of alcohol in patent medicines were urged as "antidotes" to the prohibition law by Cornelius F. Collins, justice of the court of special sessions, in an address at the tenth annual conference of charities and corrections here last night. The speaker asserted that if prohibition were strictly enforced it would bring a worse evil than alcoholism at large. "Fanciful interpretation of the law," he said, "would lead to such dire results that we hope the extremists may not have their way."

U. S. NAVY DIRIGIBLE
STARTS 1,200 MILE
FLIGHT ALONG COAST

American Balloon Starts From Montauk Point For St. John's, Newfoundland.

MAY CROSS THE ATLANTIC

Route To Be Taken by Airplanes To Azores Would Be Followed.

Montauk Point, N. Y., May 14.—The navy dirigible C-5 left here today on a flight to St. John's, Nfld., which may be followed, if the coastal performance proves satisfactory, by an attempt to fly across the Atlantic.

The balloon took the air at 8 a.m. and promptly stepped into her maximum cruising speed of 50 miles an hour, which was expected to drive the big "bag" over the 1,200-mile course to Newfoundland in 24 hours.

In command of Lieut. Commander Emory W. Coll, the C-5 took a north-easterly course expected to carry her over the naval air station at Chatham, Mass., and then continue along the New England coast to St. John's. The dirigible, "lighter than air" experts put ashore from the cruiser Chicago, with spare parts, tools and supplies of fuel, and fuel, await the "blimp" ready to assist in preparing her for a possible 2,000-mile, non-stop cruise to the British Isles.

There was a possibility, also, naval officers said, that the route of the N-C heavier-than-air machines via the Azores might be followed, reducing the longest "jump" approximately 1,300 miles by making a stop at Ponta Delgado. Adoption of this route would give the dirigible a shorter and less fatiguing passage after the N-C expedition has reached Europe, or at least completed the Newfoundland-to-Azores leg of its cruise.

Head of Special Commission To Confer With Bolshevik Premier.

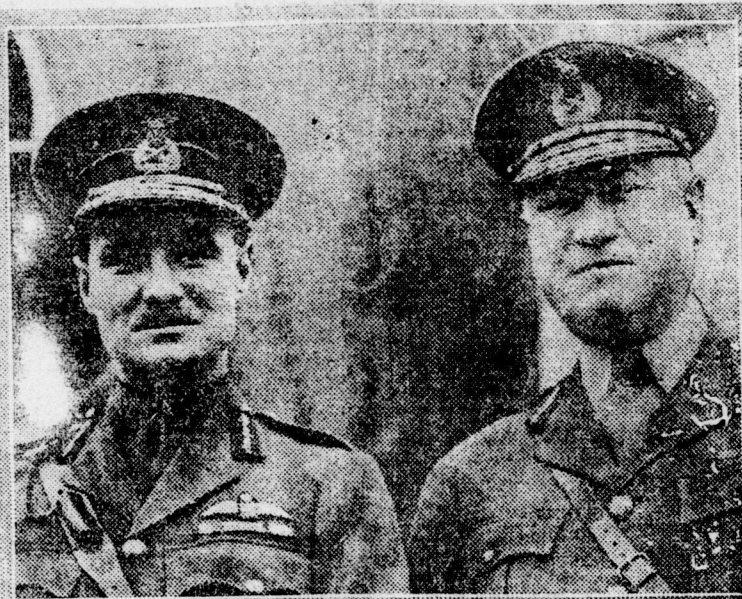

MEN FROM CASSANDRA
ARE ON WAY HOME

Toronto and Hamilton Soldiers Expect To Reach Destinations Tonight.

Montreal, May 13.—The Dominion liner Cassandra, carrying home-bound troops from the front, docked here this morning. The soldiers were dispatched to their homes on special trains, and it is hoped by military transport officials that Toronto and Hamilton men will reach their destinations by tonight. Barring delays, the Toronto and Hamilton troops should arrive home between 8 and 9 o'clock tonight. The Cassandra carried 1,588 troops, mostly from the 3rd, 4th, 19th, 48th and 75th battalions, and some from the Princess Patricia.

BRITAIN'S TONNAGE LOSSES EXCEED
MANY TIMES THAT OF OTHER ALLIES

London, May 14.—The ministry of shipping announces the number and tonnage of Allied merchantmen lost through enemy action, as follows:

Britain, 2,197; tonnage, 7,638,000. France, 238; tonnage, 697,000. Italy, 230; tonnage, 742,000. Japan, 29; tonnage, 120,000. United States, 80; tonnage, 341,000. In addition to the foregoing, 20 British vessels, tonnage 95,000, were lost on admiralty service.

START JOURNEY FOR
HOME THIS MORNING

Canada's Peace Delegates Leave Paris For British Capital.

ABSENT SIX MONTHS

Sir George E. Foster and Hon. C. J. Doherty To Remain.

Paris, May 14.—Cable from Leon Trepanier in view of the fact that the principles have been settled upon which peace is to be established. Sir Robert Borden and the Hon. Arthur Sifton left Paris this morning for London, and will proceed to Canada by the first available steamer.

They have been absent from Canada more than six months, far beyond the period anticipated when Mr. Lloyd George called them to London in November last.

Sir George Foster and Hon. C. J. Doherty will remain in Paris for the present, and it is possible that if negotiations should be of a prolonged nature they too will return to Canada before the signing of the treaty. In this event the Premier and Mr. Sifton will doubtless return to their duties in Paris at the end of the present session.

BOLSHEVIK FORCES
AGAIN DEFEATED BY
THE UKRAINIANS

Ukraine Mission Is Sent To Italy To Secure Release of Prisoners.

Vienna, Monday, May 12.—Russian Bolshevik forces have met with new defeats from the Ukrainians, led by Simon Petliura. Zelensky, another peasant leader, is leading fresh revolts throughout the governments of Kiev, Tchernigov and Poltava, and the Bolsheviks have been forced to reinforce the troops in those districts.

The government of West Ukraine has sent a mission to Italy to secure the release of prisoners held there who, it is planned, will be sent to reinforce the army fighting against the Bolsheviks.

BRUSSELS STREETS IN
MOURNING AS BODY
OF NURSE IS REMOVED

Remains of Edith Cavell On Way to England for Reinterment.

Brussels, May 13.—The remains of Miss Edith Cavell, the nurse who was executed by the Germans, which were sent to England for interment in Norwich Cathedral, were removed from Brussels today. There was a most impressive ceremony, and the streets were draped in mourning. Dense crowds stood along the curbs, while military honours were rendered by British, American and Belgian troops.

UKRAINIANS AND

Opinion Prevails That Poles Will Help Ukraine Oppose the Bolsheviks.

Paris, May 14.—The Poles and the Ukrainians have reached an agreement to cease fighting. The Ukrainians have lost heavily in the fighting with the Poles, and have also suffered in their conflicts with the Bolsheviks.

The agreement for an armistice which has been reached seems to be the basis for a belief that the Poles will assist the Ukrainians in opposing the Bolsheviks, but the accord between the two parties is restricted merely to an engagement to stop fighting.

FULFILLMENT OF
SECRET TREATY NO
LONGER DEMANDED

Italian Delegates To Peace Conference Are Making Greater Concessions.

Paris, May 14.—Italian delegates to the peace conference are no longer insisting upon the fulfillment of the secret treaty of London, and this part of the controversy relative to territory on the eastern frontier of Austria is tending to an adjustment, according to those who have taken part in the discussions. The actual status of the plan is still being discussed, as the plan to make it a free city similar to Danzig has not proved acceptable.

BRITISH AIRMEN STILL

VANQUISHED MUST
NOT EXPECT MUCH.
SAYS AUSTRIAN

Vienna, May 12.—"You must remember that as a vanquished state we must not expect much," said Chancellor Karl Renner, chief of the Austrian government, in a speech tonight for Paris. He added that he would try to obtain the best terms possible. The train pulled out amid cries from the crowd: "We are defeated! We are defeated!"

LEUT.-COL. W. G. COLES TO BE
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Two Hundred Veterans Present At the Convention Which Opened in Windsor This Morning—Several Names Mentioned As Possible Aspirants For Head Office of Association To Be Held On Friday.

Windsor, May 14.—A contest for the presidency of Ontario G. W. V. A. is now a certainty, and since the delegates have been arriving in considerable numbers at the convention now in session here it is apparent that at least seven candidates will be nominated for that office and that enough will remain in the field to make an election necessary.

Capl. W. G. Jenkins of Brantford, the present president will seek re-election and has a considerable following. Comrade J. R. Bell of Parkdale branch, Toronto, and Lieut.-Col. W. G. Coles of London, both of whom are vice-presidents, will also be recommended for the office. Field Secretary H. A. Jarvis of Ottawa, Major O'Flynn of Belleville, Comrade Bruce Taylor of Kingston and Comrade R. Harrison of the Windsor G. W. V. A. are other names persistently mentioned in connection with the contest.

When the credentials committee will be held, it is possible that the contest will shift down to two candidates. President Jenkins and Major O'Flynn. In any event the re-election of Capt. Jenkins seems a probability although some opposition is being exerted from certain quarters where there is a feeling against having a clergyman at the head of the Ontario Association. Should H. A. Jarvis or E. Harrison decide to stand for office either or both would receive influential support although the former on account of his position as field secretary has never been considered for nomination or the office. As Comrade Bell is absent from the convention owing to illness his written consent will be necessary before his nomination will be valid.

Like to Be Re-Elected.
Although Provincial Secretary W. E. Turley is under fire on account of his recent utterances against the \$2,000 gratuity question, he is in a strong position to win the office. The sentiment seems to be entirely in opposition to his views. He has been a strong supporter of the delegates who arrived yesterday, and this morning it was ascertained that there is no attack whatever upon his work as secretary, nor any effort to bring him down to date. On the contrary, he seems to hold the confidence of practically all those who have as yet arrived. In any event his position this year for first time is not elective one. After present convention he will be appointed by provincial executive committee although until the start of the opening session, Comrade R. Harrison, president, welcomed the representatives. The real situation, however, began last Tuesday afternoon, with the arrival of the Ottawa and London delegates. The arrivals continued until midnight last night, and began early this morning.

WAR EXPENDITURE
IN CANADA MORE
THAN A BILLION

British Under-Secretary For Colonial Office Submits Figures.

London, May 14.—In the House of Commons, replying to Sir J. Norton Griffiths, Col. Amery, under-secretary for the colonial office, stated that the war expenditure in Canada was approximately \$225,000,000, in Australia \$291,000,000, in New Zealand \$72,570,000, in South Africa \$23,000,000, and in Newfoundland \$2,000,000.

EMPRESS OF JAPAN
WILL DOCK MAY 21

638 Members of the Canadian Siberian Force Aboard Liner.
