RESTAURANT PRICES WILL BE SUBJECT OF INVESTIGATION

No Advance in Milk Prices Will Be Permitted in Ontario For the Next Forty Days, Says W. F. O'Connor, Vice-Chairman of Board of Commerce.

Ottawa, Sept. 19.—Two important announcements were made today by W. F. O'Connor, vice-chairman of the Canadian Board of Commerce, in connection with the fight against the high cost of living. The first is

that the prices on all foodstuffs in restaurants will be the subject of investigation. For this purpose, the services of local police and special officers will be enlisted. The other is that the order passed in Toronto prohibiting an increase in the price of milk for forty days, is effective throughout the whole province.

**DEATH AND DESOLATION
FROM HURRICANE'S WAKE**

IN MONTREAL TO WALK EAT CORPUS CHRISTI

Fifteen Hundred Homes Wiped Out by Tropical Storms.

Corpus Christi, Texas, Sept. 19.—Through the storm-swept area of Corpus Christi are wide stretches of sand and shell, where last Saturday's storm made this city a place of national repute.

Over a hundred homes, stretching along the beach for 23 blocks, were crushed and hurled away or wrecked by the waves, which reached a depth of fifteen feet in some places.

Over much of the beach section not an indication of former homes remains, except here and there a bath tub or part of a brick chimney.

From Star street, where the business section on the beach terminated, to Dan Reid street, every one of the 900 beach homes has been destroyed, and there a palm tree, while here and there a second store, hanging low with its roof bestricken leaves, marks the spot of some former show place.

Water was lapped.

In this section the bay line has changed, the water having established a new line very close to the 300 feet inland from the former position.

Oil from the shattered tanks of Port Arthur boats, and from the wreckage of a tug, has been washed ashore, and furniture in homes somewhat back from the beach and a few small boats and pelicans along the shore, many so burdened with oil they cannot fly.

Some of the business buildings are utterly demolished inside the city's electric power plant, and until this morning the restored plant could not be for at least thirty days, there will be no electric lights or street car service.

TIME LIMIT EXPIRES BUT D'ANNUNZIO IS NOT STILL IN FIVE G

Jugo-Slav Troops Are Reported To Concentrating on Frontier.

Rome, Sept. 19.—The time limit by Gen. Berlin, Thursday, Sept. 18.—The committee for foreign affairs of the national assembly has just decided, according to the Tagessblatt, to nullify Article 1 of the constitution, by which Austria would be given representation in the German Reichstag. Curt von Lersner, head of the German delegation at Versailles, has been instructed to inform the Entente powers that the demand for the peace conference relative to Article 61 will be complied with.

**Dramatic Appeal of Pierre

CONVICTED OF TREASON

**Asks To Be Confronted With
Former Premier Joseph

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Si John Willison in Address Before Industrial Conference Declares Existing Policy Has Been Contributory Cause of Present Dissatisfaction Among Workers—Advocate Legislation.

Ottawa, Sept. 19.—Another report, this time on proportional representation, came before the national industrial conference at its opening today. The report was presented by Sir John Willison, chairman of that committee, and expressed the belief that defects in the electoral system of the country were a contributory cause of social and political unrest. The declaration of the Government, that a speakers' conference would be called provided the merits of proportional representation was welcomed and the committee urged that such action be not delayed.

It is expected that several other committees will be ready to report during the day that the work of the conference will proceed rapidly from now to new experiment, but there was no reason why Canada should always wait for some other country to lead. The Canadian people were as efficient in industry and labor as in the field of education and it was trusted this efficiency would be maintained.

The resolution, which was unanimously presented by the committee, follows:

"Believing that there are defects in the merits of the present system in Canada, which defects are stated by the royal commission on industrial relations to be a contributory cause of social and political unrest.

"This conference welcomes the declaration of the prime minister on behalf of the Government, that a speakers' conference will be called to investigate the merits of the proposition, and urges that such action be taken without delay."
