TORONTO, Oct. 27 .- St. Michaels team in the intermediate intercollegiate defeated Western University of London, Ont., here today by a score of 18 to 2. St. Michaels took the ball over the visitors' line three times and converted twice. The first try was the result of a succession of bucks which carried the ball right from the centre field to the goal line; the other two were scored on loose balls. St. Michaels also notched one point on a rouge. Their last try was made just at full time.

Western's points resulted from a kick to the dead line and a rouge. St. Michaels always appeared to be the better team. Their interference proved their salvation, and this, despite the fact that they suffered loss of ground many times for infractions of the rules. 



\$500,000 Fight For World's Heavy Title Goes To Havana

Actual Signing of Agreement Awaits Coming of Cuban Interests-Kearns Demands Bonded Stake-Holder -Dempsey Gets \$300,000 Flat and Carpentier \$160,-

between Jack Dempsey and Georges Carpentier for the heavyweight championship of the world will be held in Havana, Cuba, it was an-nounced here tonight. Selection of Havana as the scene

of the contest was made by "Tex"
Rickard, Charles B. Cochran and
William Brady, who stated they had
received an offer of such proportions from a syndicate of Cuban
capitalists that it was finally determined the championship battle
would be staged in Havana.

Details of the match have been
agreed upon, and the actual signing of the articles of agreement
merely await the arrival of a representative of the Cuban syndicate.
He is expected to reach this city
within a week, and upon his arrival definite announcement of the
date of the contest will be made.

The first and last will be charged no fee. Life members fee at the outset will be \$1,000; resident members, \$300 annually; non-resident, \$100 entrance and \$50 annually, and women members \$30 a year.

One of the attractions of the building will be a swimming tank, one of the few in existence, in which world's championship swimming events can be heid.


