The rise in the water was very rapid, due to the warm air and high winds of Thursday, and on the upper waters of the Rouge River, running thru the Townships of Markham and Scarboro the body of water was heavier than for some preceeding springs. That no serious damage along this stream is reported is due to the fact that the river was comparatively free of ice. At Unionville an enormous body of water came over the dam, but Mr. Stephenson of the Union Mills had taken the precaution to remove all the gates and no damage ensued. A num-ber of minor washouts are reported in the culverts and small bridges. At Mimico the bridge was badly shat-

tered. At York Mills, on the west branch the Don River, David Birrell reported Thursday's flood as the heaviest of the year, but unattended by any loss. The absence of frost will from this time on constitute the greatest danger along the line of dams and bridges.
