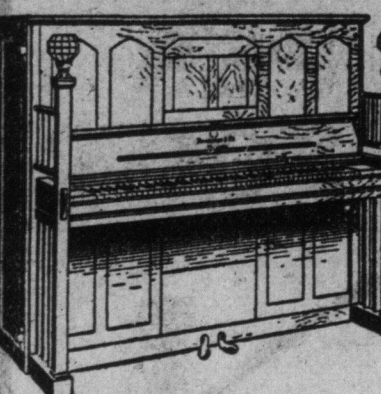

## UNIVERSITY PROFESSOR FINDS ABORIGINAL WALL

Structure of Uniform Height and Thickness Made by Mound Builders in Manitoba.

Professor Montgomery, returned yesterday from the west, having spent the summer collecting archaeological specimens for the university museum. For many years he has been carrying on field work in the prairie states, and provinces, making special study of the mounds and other remains of a prehistoric people, who once dwelt there. This season his work was a further investigation and study of the same race and their movements, and he reports this work as successful and in some respects unusually interesting and instructive. Upon one side of the now drained bed of an ancient lakelet in southern Manitoba, Prof. Montgomery discovered an aboriginal wall which had been constructed of stone boulders, and soil. This is about half a mile in length, from four to six feet in height, and about fifteen feet in thickness, its height and width showing remarkable uniformity. The wall was no doubt intended to enlarge the little lake and thus increase the supply of water and also of wild game in that locality where such were greatly needed.

Dr. Montgomery, assisted by a number of men, conducted the excavation of several mounds. Nearly two weeks were taken up in excavating one large mound which contained many interesting relics of the past. Besides human skulls and skeletons, Professor Montgomery discovered some articles made from bone and shell, which are altogether new to science. But, the most important of all, in his opinion, is the discovery of additional evidence in relation to the way in which the mounds were built, and goes to prove that the mound builders were the same as the mound builders of the east. Professor Montgomery was present at the British Science Association, Winnipeg meetings, and delivered an illustrated address upon the Archaeology of Ontario and Manitoba, before the members of the section of anthropology. He has also been collecting specimens in eastern Ontario during a part of the past summer.

## FIGHT ASSESSMENT

Yonge Street Merchants Organizing for Court of Revision.

An organized fight against the assessment levied against their property, will be made by the owners along Yonge between Wilton-avenue and College-street. A real estate expert has been secured to handle the case and meetings of both owners and holders will be held shortly to prepare evidence. An appeal will be taken to the court of revision and to the county court if necessary.

The owners claim that prices have been boosted by real estate agents beyond all reason. Some owners are caught with long leases outstanding, based on the old valuation and with the new assessment in force, nearly all the revenue would be eaten up in taxes.

## BANK ROBBER IS IN JAIL

One of the Rainy River Bandits Was Vagued at Pittsburgh.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Oct. 1.—After a month's confinement in the Cambria County Jail at Ebensburg, a prisoner, who was arrested for robbing the "blind baggage" on Pennsylvania Railroad train No. 23, gave his name as John Drummond, confessed that his real name is William Sweeney, and that he is one of the trio of young foreigners who on July 2 held up J. A. Templeton, manager of the branch Bank of Nova Scotia at Rainy River, Ontario, and escaped with nearly ten thousand dollars.

An automatic revolver, stolen from the bank, found on the prisoner, attracted the attention of the Pinkertons.

## WOMAN COMMITS SUICIDE

BAITING LOVER'S LIONS.

PARIS, Oct. 1.—A young woman committed suicide in a frightful manner to-night. Having had a quarrel with her lover, who is a lion tamer in a theatre in which three lions are introduced during the course of a melodrama, the woman went behind the scenes and thrust her arm into the cage. The animal was wounded in the face, and with a few blows of their claws tore her head and breast to pieces.

## New Bill of Lading.

The new bill of lading which was designed by the Canadian Manufacturers' Association and adopted by the railway commission, the feature of which is greater protection for the shipper and more responsibility for the carrier, went into effect yesterday. Under the old bill of lading, railways and other carriers shouldered very little responsibility for the goods in their possession and shippers and consignees were obliged often to collect for damaged goods thru the courts. The owner of the goods was formerly obliged to prove the carrier's negligence where goods were lost or damaged in transit, but under the present rules the onus of proof is on the carriers.

## Newspaper Sells School Bonds.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 1.—The Los Angeles Examiner, associate of The New York American, today completed one of the most extraordinary campaigns in the history of American municipalities by overselling at popular subscription the bonds of the city of Los Angeles, for which no tender had been secured when offered in the regular way.

## Apartment House Sold.

The Robins, Limited, have put thru the sale of Hudson Bros. apartment house at the corner of Grange and Beverly-streets to Mrs. M. Shaw for \$40,000. The house contains forty apartments.

## ELECTION TRIAL SAW-OFF DOESN'T PLEASE JUDGES

Recommend Further Enquiry—Liberal Petitioners Had Called Halt to the Trial.

CHARLOTTETOWN, P.E.I., Oct. 1.—The counsel for the petitioner in the trial of the election of Governor A. J. Fraser, M.P., Conservative for Kings, announced that they had decided not to take further evidence. Absolute evidence of the wrong had been established, the difficulty was to establish agency. The dismissal of the petition was, therefore, asked for. The judges stated that they could not dismiss the case, but after three hours' consideration of the evidence they found that the evidence was not sufficient to establish the case, and that the petition was dismissed.

The proceedings stopped as the result of an agreement between the parties, whereby the counter-petition against J. J. Hughes, Progressive Conservative, is to be withdrawn; also the case against Hughes for violation of the independence of Parliament Act. Fraser is understood also that the petition against Prowse, Liberal for Queen's, will be dropped.

## ALPINE CLIMBING WORSE THAN POLAR EXPEDITIONS

GENEVA, Switzerland, Oct. 1.—The annual death toll of the Alps, this year 15 killed and 21 injured, has aroused widespread public opinion thruout Switzerland, and the strongest pressure possible is being brought to bear in favor of the enactment of strict government regulations to control mountain climbing.

## Deepening of Welland Canal

It is urged by the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence Navigation and Improvement Association as a reason for deepening the Welland canal that steamship companies would transport the wheat crop for from two to three cents less than at present, thus saving about \$3,000,000 to the western farmers.

This argument is contained in a circular addressed by the president, H. W. Richardson, to municipalities and boards of trade asking them to aid in presenting the federal government for a grant to carry out the work.

## Will Have Plant Here

Otto T. Barnard, president of the National Trust Company, New York, who has been selected as the Realty candidate as mayor for New York City, is chairman of the board of directors of the Herring-Hall-Martin Bay Co., which company is about to erect a large plant in Canada in connection with the Canadian Furber Co., its Canadian representatives.

MONTREAL, Oct. 1.—Hon. J. J. Curran, justice of the supreme court of Quebec, died suddenly here today. He was a cabinet minister under Sir John Thompson and under Sir Mackenzie Bowell. Judge Curran went to Europe for a three months' trip for the benefit of his health during the past summer, and returned about two weeks ago. The journey did not have the desired effect.

He leaves one son and two daughters. His son Frank was the Conservative candidate in St. Ann's for the commons in a by-election previous to the general.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Oct. 1.—William A. Dreher, a wealthy leather manufacturer from Erie, Pa., fell on a train at Alta, California, last Thursday. Two hours after he fell he wired his wife to wait for him in Oakland. She waited until Saturday night, and then appeared to the Knights of Pythias. He was found to-day working on a vineyard at Mayfield station. He knows his name, but seemed to have forgotten nearly everything else.

## Burglar Caught in Act.

GUELPH, Oct. 1.—William Hendricks, from Detroit, was caught in the act of robbing the house of J. W. Lyon at 1 o'clock this morning. He had only obtained a few trinkets when he was caught.
