



Governor Chambers did not advance the point jocularly, but from an earn-est belief that the lives of his charges est belief that the lives of his charges should be made no more burdensome than necessary during the period of their detention. He said that during his connection wit hthe jail he found that ninety per cent. of the men prisoners found the greatest hardship in the deprivation of tobacco, and this he felt was an unnecessary hardship, and one which was not in the spirit of correction, but rather led the criminal to regard his punishment in the light of retaliation.
