North Parkdale Methodist Church Honors Members Who Died Fighting.

rifteen members of the congrega-n of the North Parkdale Methodist urch have laid down their lives in se of an impressive memorial assivice, their pictures were flashed on a screen. It was a pathetic incident and many of those present, friends and relatives of the dead heroes, were overcome, one woman having to be led out. The pastor, Rev. Dr. J. C. er, gave a brief description of the rk in connection with the church ich the dead soldiers had performed. At the close he sounded a word of warning to the present government, "One of the tragedies of the past has been the wounded old soldier," e said, "and I pray that it may never be again. The time is coming when we have to take care of the wounded soldiers, and the wives and orphans, and I cannot think that any government existing or likely to exist, will not do what ever they can to provide for these. They have not done so as yet, but they must do all they can for the dependents of these brave nen who went away, leaving all they held dear to lay down their lives. For those who have died, we can do nothing, but this country owes it to eir memory to take care of the de-mdents, and this is the message that the brave lads who have gone would

Wish me to impart to you."

The greacher pointed out that the Book of Revelations was a book of word pictures, and said that no one could write a word picture today that would represent the present crisis better. He maintained that the Lord Jesus Christ was the leading personality in the present war. "I have no hesitation in saying that as far as the Inestitation in saying that as far as the leader of our armies is concerned, that leader is Jesus Christ," he said. 
