WILLIE HOPPE WINNER.

New York, Dec. 7.—Willie Hoppe, holder of the world's professional 15.2 talk line billiards championship, won his second game of the titular tournament here tonight, defeating Jake Schaefer of San Francisco, 400 to 176 in 14 innings.

The champion, to retain his title, has only to win one of his two games tomorrow with Schaefer and Walker Cochran of San Francisco, each of whom has won once and lost twice.

Hoppe set a high run record for the tournament, 179, in his third inning. Jake Schaefer, of San Francisco, turned the tables on Walker Cochran of San Francisco in the third game, 400 to 207, playing lasting 18 innings. In tonight's game, Schaefer was pitted against Willie Hoppe, the defending title holder.

WINNIPEG TO HONOR GEORGES CARTIER

Accepts Offer of Bronze Bust of Statesman—Erecting Suitable Monument.

Montreal, Dec. 7.—The project to fittingly honor the memory of the eminent Canadian statesman, Sir Georges Etienne Cartier, through the Dominion of Canada, has been advanced still another step thru arrangements which have been made for the erection of a monument to his honor at Winnipeg. This has been brought about thru an offer of a bust of Cartier to the government of Manitoba by his daughter, Miss Hortense Cartier, and a few members of the Cartier centenary committee.

Manitoba Accepts. The government of Manitoba has accepted this offer, and have undertaken the erection of a suitable pedestal. The bust, which is in bronze, four feet high, is now being prepared for shipment by the sculptor, G. W. Hill, Montreal.

The bust is a replica of that erected at Cartier's birthplace, St. Antoine-on-the-Richelieu. This bust was cast in Brussels, to replace the original bust ordered for St. Antoine, which was lost in transit following the outbreak of the war, but which was subsequently traced and forwarded.

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CONFLICTING VIEWS OVER GAUTHIER

Le Devoir Positive Cabinet Appointment Is Settled—Ottawa Contradicts.

Montreal, Dec. 7.—Le Devoir says today that the statement of M. L. Gauthier, M.P. for St. Hyacinthe, into the federal cabinet has been settled, and that an announcement to this effect is only a matter of hours. Le Devoir adds that Sir Lomer Gouin, whose retirement from the management of La Presse, in order to devote himself to his duties as president of the Montreal University, was announced yesterday, is no stranger to the arrangement to have Mr. Gauthier enter the cabinet.

Le Devoir further intimates that it is believed in well-informed circles that Sir Lomer himself will shortly go to Ottawa.

Doubtful in Ottawa. Ottawa, Dec. 7.—There was nothing forthcoming from official circles tonight in regard to the statement in Le Devoir of Montreal, that M. L. Gauthier, Liberal member for St. Hyacinthe, will be taken into the federal cabinet almost immediately. It is a club house, and it is not the custom of the cabinet to appeal here that his inclusion in the cabinet in the near future is very doubtful. Premier Meillon is maintaining absolute silence in regard to alleged negotiations for the inclusion of a French-Canadian commoner in the ministry.

NEW CLUB HOUSE FOR THE ISLAND A.A.A.

At South End of the Regatta Course, Which Association Would Improve.

The Dominion Day Regatta Association and delegates of Toronto Aquatic Club met last night at the residence of the secretary, Huron street, there being present: P. J. Mulqueen, president; in the chair, Major C. Horn, vice-president; J. J. Dolan, secretary; J. J. Dolan (Toronto C.C.), H. Dibble (Dons), A. Carter (Dons), S. G. Reid and C. King (Balm Beach), J. L. Ferguson (Apses), J. Lynch and H. Weismiller (Parkdale C.C.), A. Ireland (Island A.A.A.).

The sub-committee, Messrs. Mulqueen, Hera and Dolan's report as follows was adopted, viz.: That the course at the Island should be deepened to eight feet and widened at the south end, where it was reported that the Island Amateur Association had a plan for a club house, plans for which were already out. Regatta, the last Saturday in August, and the Dominion Day Regatta on July 1.

The western division paddling preliminaries will also be decided over this course in July.

STATE RECEPTION BY DEVONSHIRES

Function in Montreal One of Most Brilliant in Canadian History.

Montreal, Dec. 7.—(By Canadian Press).—His Excellency, the Governor General and the Duchess of Devonshire tonight held a reception at the art gallery held, which was attended by nearly 1,500 of Montreal's leading citizens. It was the first state function of the kind held in Montreal for several years, and was easily one of the most outstanding in brilliance ever seen in the Dominion.

Immediately on arrival of their excellencies, they, with their suite, proceeded to the art gallery upstairs where the reception and presentations took place, the ceremony lasting for an hour and a half. Instead of the formality of bows and curtsies, the duke and duchess stood during the whole ceremony and shook hands with each lady and gentleman presented.

Following the levee there was a general gathering of people in the chambers and halls of the art gallery.

COAL MONT WOMAN VICTIM OF MURDERER

Jury Finds Mrs. Hattie McBride's Death Due to Foul Play.

Princeton, B. C., Dec. 7.—A verdict of murder by the jury in the case of Mrs. Hattie McBride, who was found dead in the coal mine, near here, several days ago.

Local police are searching for clues. Mrs. McBride was well-to-do and kept large sums of money in the house, but the theory of robbery was discounted by discovery of a bundle of bills and other money in the remains of a burned trunk.

Valuing the colors of the 'Irish republic,' the crowd formed in parade outside the station to escort Mrs. MacSwiney and Miss Mary MacSwiney, her daughter, to a private residence, where they will be entertained during their visit here.
