

THEY ARE IN ENGLAND

Fifteen Hundred Wives, Mothers and Sisters of Soldiers—They Are Canvassing for Union Government

(Special Cable to the Times by F. A. McKenzie. Copyright.) London, Dec. 9.—Fifteen thousand Canadian women—wives, mothers or sisters of our troops—are anxious to support union but now discover that their residence in England deprives them of votes. Only nurses or other women formally enrolled can cast a ballot. Even A. D.'s are disfranchised. Ladies to whom I have talked are enthusiastic supporters of the government. They realise the importance of the issues because, being on the spot, they see actual facts. Many of them are hard canvassers among the troops against Laurierism. They have appealed to Hon. Geo. H. Perry to see if something cannot be done.


Mr. Perry declares he has no power. The law does not provide for them. This does not unsatisfy them and they demand that the government take action even at this late moment and give them their rights. The following messages have reached me: Mrs. Walton McKeown, wife of Lieut.-Colonel McKeown, says it is unfair to the women who are as well informed and interested in the issues about to be decided as any. Mrs. Gilmour Morrill suggests that immediate action be taken to secure the vote. Mrs. Isobel Oliver, wife of a captain from Saskatchewan, says the women in England, wives of fighting men who have worked enthusiastically for Canada's army, visiting hospitals, nursing as V. A. D.'s, serving in canteens and doing everything that comes to hand during three long years, protest indignantly against the franchise discrimination "which excludes us from voting to support the armies and Canada's cause.
