

Fifteen Hundred Wives, Mothers and Sisters of Soldiers-They Ace Canvassing for Union Govenment

London, Dec. 9-Fifteen thousand Rev. Joseph Hayes of the Cathedral staff has been appointed acting pastor of the Catholic church at Florenceville in place of Rev. Father Bradley who has been in poor health for some time. Father Hayes has already entered upon his new duties. residence in England deprives them of votes. Only nurses or other women formally enrolled can cast a ballot. Even women working hard in France as V. A. D.'s are disfranchised.
