AIRMEN USE QUEER CAMERA OVER BATTLE FIELDS

When a German aeroplane on reconnaissance duty over the French lines was recently brought down by the allies, an aerial camera of an odd type was recovered intact. The instrument is described, with illustrations, in the August Popular Mechanics Magazine. It proved to be a splendid instrument and has attracted much interest among members

of the flying corps. At the rear of the case a handle and trigger like those of a revolver are provided, the latter being used to operate the shutter. It weighs about twelve pounds, and has an additional handle near the front end so that it can be held with two hands when in use. The lenses are in universal focus and tests have shown that faultless photographs can be obtained with the instrument at heights varying from 100 to 1,500 yards.

MEXICO'S NEW ARMY
(Harry H. Dunn, in Cartoons Magazine)
The Mexican army of today is as different from that of the time when Porfirio Diaz thought he had 32,000 soldiers and woke to find barely 14,000, as is the German army that swept through Belgium different from our handful of 50,000 down in Texas. Six years ago, the Mexican army was composed of the ruffian of Mexico, convicts, political prisoners, drab slaves who served because they owed money to some friend and independence because they had been bought and not enslaved, the regular army of the Diaz administration was herded to its work as the Russians were driven into battle at Port Arthur or bound, as Guatemalan soldiers are chained to their barracks lest they flee. Today, the Mexican army is composed of free men, most of them bandits, it is true, many of them murderers, few of them to be trusted out of sight of their commanding officers, but all fighting because they want to fight, not because they have to fight. And those who judge the coming opposition of the Mexican army of 1916 by that which the forces of Santa Ana put up nearly seventy years ago are as mistaken as those who would attempt to compare the Armada with the British North Sea fleet.

Is H. M. Blair's Brother (Prescription Mail)

It is announced that the provincial government has dispensed with the services of Thomas Blair of St. Mary's, brother of Henry M. Blair, who has held the position of concrete inspector. The dismissal was made by Hon. P. G. Mahoney, ex-M.P., the rejected of Westmorland. Having dismissed Mr. Blair, Mr. Mahoney should now proceed to dismiss himself. Rejected by the people of Westmorland at the polls, he has no right to hold office and draw his salary as minister of public works. In regard to Mr. Blair, he has been in the employ of the government for five or six years, and was considered a valuable man, especially at election times. On several occasions he was selected by Col. McLeod, M.P., for special duty at Canterbury Station on polling day. Particulars as to why Mr. Blair's services were dispensed with are somewhat meagre, but one is justified in assuming that he was not fired for offensive partisanship, but because he is a brother of the ex-secretary of the public works department.

Gagetown Boy Drowned.
Roy Cooper, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Cooper, of Gagetown, was the victim of a distressing drowning accident there yesterday afternoon. He, with some other boys, were swimming off Gaunce's wharf when, going out beyond his depth, he was seized with a cramp and sank. His companions were too young to assist him and he drowned. Twenty minutes later the body was recovered. The lad was twelve years of age, and the fatality saddened the entire community in and about Gagetown.
