

Local Council of Women Consider National Agenda

A meeting of the Local Council of Women was held yesterday afternoon with Mrs. R. J. Hooper presiding in place of Mrs. E. A. Smith, the president. The agenda paper of the National Council meeting was read and the local delegates were given instructions as to how to vote on the different questions. A hearty welcome was extended to Mrs. Hooper on her return from England by Miss Grace W. Leavitt on behalf of the Council.

As Mrs. A. W. Estey and Miss Grace Leavitt, appointed delegates, were unable to attend the national meeting, Mrs. A. C. D. Wilson and Mrs. J. D. Seely were appointed to fill their places. The other delegates are Mrs. Alice E. Estey, Mrs. E. A. Young, Mrs. J. H. Doody and Mrs. H. B. Peck.

Nominations for the national officers were voted on. Mrs. C. E. Carmichael's name was the only nomination for president. The six chosen for vice-presidents were: Mrs. Ralph Smith, Vancouver; Mrs. William Dennis, Halifax; Mrs. Adam Shortt, Toronto; Dr. Augusta Stowe Gullen, Toronto; Mrs. Charles Thorburn, Ottawa; Magistrate Mrs. Murphy, Edmonton; and responding secretary, Mrs. Horace Parsons, Toronto; recording secretary, Mrs. Harry Carpenter, treasurer, left to discretion of delegates.

Committee conveners were named as follows: Conservation, Mrs. Hewitt, Gunning, N. S.; Citizenship, Mrs. Tweeddale, Niagara Falls; education, to be decided; films and printed matter, delegates to decide; fine arts, Mrs. Dignam; household economics, Mrs. John E. Owens, St. John; house and town planning, Mrs. Bundy; immigration, Mrs. Harold Lawrence, St. John; laws, Mrs. O. C. Edwards; League of Nations, Mrs. Clement, Brandon; mental hygiene, Mrs. Sted, Halifax; employment, Mrs. Lewis, Edmonton; national recreation, Mrs. Forbes Reid; soldiers' pensions, Mrs. Jean Maitland; public health, Mrs. Baulter, Toronto; Mrs. E. M. Murray, Halifax.

Provincial vice-presidents were named as follows: Alberta, Mrs. Edwards; British Columbia, Mrs. D. Scott; Manitoba, Mrs. S. E. Clement; New Brunswick, Mrs. E. Atherton Smith; Nova Scotia, Mrs. Stanfield; Ontario, Mrs. Smythe, Quebec; Dr. Ritchie, England; Saskatchewan, Mrs. Stapleford, Regina.

These nominations were made to instruct delegates.

The programme for the national annual meeting was read.

Dr. Harding on Milk Situation.

Dr. H. A. Harding, of Detroit, milk expert, was admitted. He said he had been puzzled to know what the trouble was about over milk in St. John. The milk supply compared favorably with that of any city. A few cans were rejected each day, but the milk was natural. The St. John pasteurization plant which he had inspected was new, carefully kept and well managed. The reasons for not taking milk away were the same as those for not eating raw meat.

He explained the process of pasteurization. Those who thought they could tell the difference between the same milk pasteurized and unpasteurized by taste, he said, were "kidding" themselves.

He passed around temperature charts which recorded the temperature of the milk pasteurized in the St. John plant since it was first opened, showing the plant was running properly. The then operating plant, he said, were familiar with the work and considerable experience, and were also carrying out their duties in a clean and competent way.

His tests of the milk had shown that Friday's milk was sweet on Monday. He said some confusion had arisen by the use of the word "sour" for any unusual taste in milk. Pasteurization would lessen flavors due to unsuitable feeding of cattle but would not do away with these flavors. An appearance of a decrease of cream would be due to a slight raising of the pasteurization temperature which was done at the plant to make sure the process was effective when complaints of milk souring were made.

Replying to Mrs. Hooper's inquiry about how milk could be kept in hot weather, Dr. Harding said all that was necessary was to keep it as cool as possible. He said he had never known such a situation to arise when pasteurization was inaugurated elsewhere but similar conditions were usual when there was a milk drivers' strike or other trouble. He believed the trouble in St. John was part of a nerve and part of a business struggle.

Members present, including Mrs. A. C. D. Wilson and Mrs. A. W. Estey, spoke of their entire satisfaction with pasteurized milk, which they had used for two years.

Mrs. Hope Thompson asked if it was not best to keep the milk of each cow separate. Dr. Harding said greater uniformity was obtained by blending milk. Dr. Harding was thanked for his address. He had been introduced by Dr. William Warwick.

National Council Resolutions.

The majority of resolutions to come before the annual meeting of the National Council were concurred in. Reduction of the number of delegates from local councils from six to four was not approved.

Arrangements for delegates' traveling expenses were discussed.

Arrangements were made for having Mrs. E. A. Young's resolution forwarded to the National Council. The resolution refers to the endorsement of the action of the Great War Veterans in their endeavor to have the recommendation of the Royal Commission on Soldiers' Pensions carried out.

Oppose Home Study.

The following resolutions were laid on the table:

1. Whereas Women's Institutes all over New Brunswick standing behind the health movement, which is included in the programme of home-making, and

Whereas, they are of the opinion that home studies are menacing to the health of the children of the province, therefore, be it

Resolved, that this convention petition the Minister of Health to take the matter up with the Board of Education to the end of reforming this abuse.

2. Whereas the forest wealth of this province is being destroyed by fire every year, and the loss by fire in New Brunswick is, according to population, greater than in any other part of the world, and as the daily papers are constantly reporting fires largely due to carelessness, therefore, be it

Resolved that in the opinion of this convention the investigation concerning the origin of such fires be made by the Government instead of being left to private individuals, also that those found guilty be severely punished.

3. That the matter of paying the annual fee \$500 to the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada was discussed. The New Brunswick Institute never has obtained sufficient money to make this annual payment but a grant of \$500 was available from the province. It was decided that that amount should be applied to the payment instead of raising the money from the individual institutes.

Women's Institute Consider Resolutions

The eleventh annual meeting of the New Brunswick Women's Institute was concluded yesterday afternoon in Fredericton. An invitation from St. John for the 1924 annual session was received and will be considered.

Resolutions were passed as follows: 1. That if there be no children nor any legal representative of them, then the whole of surviving real and personal property of the husband be allowed the widow during her lifetime and at her death to the husband's next of kin.

2. Whereas, it is reported that several vendors appointed by the Government have been found guilty of violations of the prohibitory law, and have been allowed to continue as vendors after payment of stated fine contrary to the proper enforcement of the act, therefore

Resolved that this Women's Institute respectfully urge upon the Government the cancellation of vendorships or licenses to all such violators.

3. Whereas, the members of the Women's Institute do all in their power to favor only educational pictures and clean humor for children, also a purer, snarer standard for serials.

4. That the Women's Institutes now in session recommend to the Government the need of a residence for female students at the Normal school.

5. That the laws relating to the wife's interest in property and real estate be looked into the amended so as to include her interest in lumber lands or so called wild lands.

6. That the right to vote at school meetings be given to wives of ratepayers, also that women be eligible to act as trustees on all school boards.

In connection with this resolution it was decided that delegates carry it to all institutes and arrange for petitions which, after signing, are to be sent to the advisory board to go before the Legislature at the next session.
