Resolved, that this convention petition the Minister of Health to take the matter up with the Board of Education to the end of reforming this abuse.

2.—Whereas the forest wealth of this province is being destroyed by fire every year, and the loss by fire in New Brunswick is, according to population, greater than in any other part of the world, and as the daily papers are constantly reporting fires largely due to carelessness, therefore, be it

Resolved that in the opinion of this convention the investigation concerning the origin of such fires be made by the Government instead of being left to private individuals, also that those found guilty be severely punished.

The matter of paying the annual fee \$500 to the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada was discussed. The New Brunswick Institute never has obtained sufficient money to make this annual payment but a grant of \$500 was available from the province. It was decided that that amount should be applied to the payment instead of raising the money from the individual institutes.

EIGHT-HOUR DAY ORDERED BY ITALIAN GOVERNMENT

Rome, June 13.—The Italian Government has decreed that the working day for all industrial and commercial houses shall not exceed eight hours. In hospitals, institutions of learning or charity or bureaus of public works, if they have workers who are under the supervision of some one and who receive salaries or any kind of remuneration, these workers shall not work more that eight hours a day, or forty-eight hours a week.


This does not apply to the personnel in charge of business establishments, to employes on shipboard, commercial travelers or servants. The law goes into effect about four months hence.


