

#### War Gave London Cafeteria Idea

Plan of Serving Food to be Undertaken By the Government

London, June 27.—The war has brought the cafeteria idea to the public. This plan of serving food to the public at minimum prices is to be undertaken by the government, and will be known as the Ministry of Food's Model National Kitchen and Restaurant. The Director of National Kitchens announced recently that he hoped by the new method to be able to supply good wholesome food at less than one-third the prices charged at popular tea shops and restaurants in London, and not only pay rent and all establishment charges, but also to clear a profit of 25 per cent. All food is to be prepared and cooked within plain view of the public, windows separating the kitchen from the dining room proper. It is also proposed to deliver food at offices in the neighborhood at an additional charge of a few cents. The food kitchen officials say the table napery, cutlery and crockery will compare favorably with that used in the good London restaurants. The restaurant is to be in New Bridge street, Blackfriars, not far from Fleet street. If the demand from night workers in the newspaper offices and other shops in the neighborhood justifies such action it is planned to keep the state restaurant open all night.

#### BELIEVE PREPARATIONS FOR NEXT GERMAN DRIVE ARE ABOUT COMPLETED

German Troops on West Front Meanwhile Suffer From Grippe and Typhus

With the British Army in France, June 26.—(By the Associated Press)—German troops on the western front are suffering from an epidemic of grippe which incapacitates them for a week or ten days. There are also many cases of typhus and dysentery in their lines southwest of Lille. There is no evidence, however, that these illnesses are responsible for the postponement of the new offensive. It is believed that the German high command has nearly completed its preparations for the next great attack. The artillery is being moved into position and the German infantry in Flanders has been complaining of the bad shooting conditions. Captured German orders show many complaints of this kind, and it is indicated that the German troops have been suffering badly from the British fire, one order showing that the spirit of the enemy troops had deteriorated in consequence. A captured order signed by a colonel of a German regiment shows the anxiety of the German command to ascertain the exact strength of the allied forces opposing him. The order complains of the failure to secure prisoners and recommends a renewed attempt by an ambush patrol because information of the disposition of the British behind the front is scanty. The patrol went out as ordered. The officer in charge was captured by British, and the men with him bolted back to their own lines. London, June 27.—Influenza is now epidemic all along the German front, according to advice received here from the Dutch frontier. The proportion of men sent to hospital on account of influenza has risen rapidly in all the German units in the last few days, and special hospitals are being established in the rear areas.

#### New Enemy Device Of Frightfulness

Incendiary Bomb Collects Crowd, Then Projectile is Dropped

Paris, June 27.—"Fliegerbaum," a new device of frightfulness, is the name given by the Germans to a recently perfected bomb which, according to their own claims, will multiply one hundredfold the precision and effect of night bombardments. The bomb weighs less than two pounds, enabling an aviator to carry hundreds at a single trip and is said to be employed especially against crowds of people. Instructions found on the person of a German aviator, who was captured the other day say that in order to get the greatest efficiency and result the low flying aviator must throw several incendiary bombs on the object of attack. After a pause of minutes to permit the crowd to gather around the burning object, as they naturally would in order to extinguish the flames, the aviators must swoop down and throw this fliegerbaum into the midst of the group.

#### DEATH OF CHANCELLOR OF QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY.

Kingston, Ont., June 26.—Prof. Watson, vice-president of Queen's University, will represent the university at the funeral of Dr. James Douglas, chancellor of Queen's, who died in New York yesterday. The funeral will be held on Friday morning to Quebec.

#### PUTS AMERICANS ON SUGAR ALLOWANCE.

Washington, June 27.—The restriction of the American people to one and half ounces of sugar a day for each individual during the next six months was ordered yesterday by Food Commissioner Herbert Hoover.



#### freedom of movement of enemy craft through the northern coast to the North Sea, are proving very fruitful. Secondly, the steps taken to defend merchant shipping against mines and U-boats—providing ships with other mine protection and organizing convoys—are giving admirable results. Thirdly, apart from the wonderful record the Americans are putting up in shipbuilding, British yards are making headway owing to the fact that plans drawn up several months ago for the extension of yards and engine shops are beginning to be productive.

Mr. Hurd says that the losses in British shipping in May exceeded the tonnage built by 28,000 tons and concludes: "There already is evidence to show that the situation has still further improved since the end of May. The curves are continuing a most encouraging course."

#### NEW STAMPUPE REGULATIONS IN PROVINCE OF QUEBEC

Quebec, June 27.—As a result of an interview which the timber limit-holders had recently with Sir Lomer Gouin and Hon. Jules Allard respecting timber dues and ground rent, and at which the limit-holders agreed to forego certain privileges, a new tariff has been issued which for stampage dues will come into effect at the beginning of 1918-19, and for ground rents, next May. The new tariff is: Stampage dues, for the first five years, \$2.60 a thousand feet; second five years, \$3; red pine, \$3 for ten years; spruce, \$1.60 first five years, \$1.80 second five years, and \$1.40 for ten years; cedar, 10c. for ten years; ground rent, \$6.50 for the first five years and \$8 for the second five years.


