In the Church of the Assumption Rev. J. J. O'Donovan celebrated requiem mass and the body then was escorted, thrummed as pall-bearers, to the Fredericton train. Burial will be in the capital city. Many friends attended the funeral of John Bradley, by the late Mrs. Bradley, his mother's residence, Riverside. Interment was in the Catholic burying ground at Rothesay. Magnificent floral pieces marked the deep feeling of sorrow caused by his death.

MISTOOK STAKE FOR BUOY; THAT'S WHY THE MAY QUEEN GROUND

River Steamer Had Not Been Freed This Morning and Two Tugs Are Going From Here To Her Aid

Someone who foolishly drove a stake in dangerous ground Grand Point, Grand Bay, is said to have been responsible for the river steamer May Queen running ashore there yesterday at noon. The report is that a stake was mistaken for the wheelman for the buoy, and he went into the danger zone, running the boat high on the shore, so that there is only three feet of water at her bow. The tugs Fannie and Clayton attempted for several hours this morning to haul her off, but were unsuccessful. More help was sent for and the tugs Wasson and Hunter will leave the city this afternoon to assist. Captain R. H. Weston is confident that his craft will be hauled off.

The Fannie and Clayton, which were at Chipman, came down last night to assist the grounded steamer. At daylight lines were fastened, and the two tugs worked until ten o'clock. Seeing their efforts were fruitless, the cargo on the steamer was removed to scows. The perishable goods were taken ashore and were sent to Gagetown, and will be brought to the city on the Victoria.

The passengers have all been taken ashore safely, and most of them have returned to their homes. After the steamer ran aground, they remained aboard for some time, hoping that she would get free under her own steam, but after a few hours they went ashore. No word could be secured from Captain Weston or any other members of the crew this morning, but word reached the office of the river steamer companies that the affair was purely accidental on the part of the wheelman. It comes to the point that a stake was driven off the bank by some unknown person, and the man at the wheel mistook this for the starboard buoy and ran ashore under full steam. The bow plunged into the mud and drove in solidly.

The tugs Wasson and Hunter which will leave this afternoon are taking tarpaulins to cover the cargo, which has been placed in scows. The steamer is now relieved of all superfluous weight, and the captain is confident that the four tugs will be able to pull her off. If not, the cargo will be brought down

ACKNOWLEDGE RECEIPT OF FINE SUM FOR ORPHANS


THE CALLEDONIAN TEAM
