

A motion of Alderman Scully that the service be kept going until 12 o'clock every night except on Sunday, was carried. The extra trips will be from the West Side at 11.50 and from the East Side at 12 o'clock, midnight. The recommendation that a new wharf be built was referred back to the committee for more information.

ASSOCIATED CHARITIES.
At the monthly meeting of the Associated Charities yesterday a resolution was adopted urging legislation providing for a Children's Aid Society. The Associated Charities have in their work felt the need of such legislation.

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"Rev. G. F. Scovil presided at the meeting. The secretary reported that 321 applications of one kind and another had been received during March, and 83 of them were for temporary or regular employment. Employment was found for 5 and a number of others were recommended. The majority of applicants were women and girls. There were only elevemen. Twenty-four persons applied for relief.
