Financial Letter

New York, Nov. 7.—Bullish operations are probable again. On business we expect to see considerable realizing from those who may entertain election apprehensions. On any decline, we think good buying will be found. There are good reasons for believing that but few shorts will care to remain outstanding over election. This will induce a covering movement some time today. We favor purchases of a discriminating character on reacts with stop order protection. Election news, of course, dominates the newspaper field this morning. Dix seems to be the most prominent, with Roosevelt still at work up state. There is no change in the heavy odds against Simons. We believe from what we can see that the Democrats will win for Dix and congress. Such a result would be favorable to the market. The repudiation of Roosevelt in New York state by a big vote the favorable result would be two-fold. The copper statement this week should be favorable, also the crop statement of the government. The steel report to come Thursday will not be good. The bank statement is unfavorable, but as money is easier abroad and no stringency here, the situation is not a factor with a decision over topping things. Market literature is conservative as rule.

THE ALLAN CASE.

In the police court this afternoon John Allen was further remanded on the charge of obtaining money under false pretences. F. E.
