UNDER SPEEDY TRIALS

Application was made by Ernest Cannon to be tried before Judge Ritchie under the "Speedy Trials Act." Cannon is accused of stealing pipes from C. P. R. shed, No. 6 on the night of February 26. The preliminary examination was held before Magistrate Ritchie and he was sent up for trial. The case is set for tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock.

COMPLAINT AGAINST CONSTABLE

In the city court before Judge Ritchie this morning H. W. Robertson applied to have Constable Wilbur Belyea ordered to make returns for seven executions for which it was said he had not accounted. Mr. Robertson complained that he had given the executions to Belyea to attend to, but that, apparently, the constable had not done so, and the lawyer had to pay for the charges himself. STEAMER ON MUSSEL HEAD

While coming up to her wharf at Sand Point about 9.30 this morning the C. P. R. Australian liner Wakatua, Captain Mackenzie, touched on a mussel bed off Reed's Point. She arrived off the island last evening and was in tow of the tug (Cruiser and Lord Kitchener when she was carried by a strong easterly wind, onto the mussel bed. The tug Neptune went to the assistance of the steamer but it was found that the two tug boats were all that was necessary to free her. There was not any danger, as the place is not one where any damage could be done.

THE CELEBRATION OF ST. PATRICK'S DAY IN ST. JOHN

The Arrangements for Tomorrow's Parade to the Cathedral—The Events for Tomorrow Evening

With fine weather tomorrow should be a notable event for the members of the Catholic societies in the city who intend observing the feast of the patron saint of Ireland, St. Patrick, with a parade to church, as the procession gives promise of being the largest of its kind yet conducted in the societies taking part in the parade will convene at their respective rooms at 9 o'clock, and later assemble in the street east where they will line up and march to the cathedral where high mass will be celebrated, with Bishop Casey absent. Rev. D. S. O'Keefe will preach a sermon appropriate to the feast.

The route of march will be from King street east to Springy, to Waterloo to the church, and returning via Richmond, Brussels, Union, Dock, Market Square, King Charlotte, to King Square, where the parade will disband.

In the evening a banquet will be held by the members of the A. O. H. and their friends to the number of 100 or more after the performance of "Goom-Na-Gopel" by the Y. M. C. A. of St. John, in the Opera House. E. L. Barrett, president of No. 1 Division will preside, and it is expected that P. J. McManus, of Halifax will be among the guests. The toast list will include the King, The A. O. H., The Day We Celebrate, City of St. John, Our Home, Ireland, land of the Shamrock, and "The Ladies' Auxiliary" while a musical and literary programme will be given in which Mrs. R. Campbell, Mrs. M. Carroll, Miss A. McNeil, and F. Barrett will contribute solos, and Thos. Pope and Jas. H. McHugh readings.

St. Patrick's Society will have their dinner in the Victoria Hotel in the evening and the performances for the orphans, as before announced, will be given by the Catholic societies.

THE STAR LINE S.S. CO. BOOKS AND ACCOUNTS

J. Willard Smith on Witness Stand Before Judge McLeod—Hearing Likely to Last Several Days

By order of Mr. Justice McLeod, J. Willard Smith, late manager and president of the Star Line S. S. Co., was examined before His Honor in chambers this morning. The examination was the result of the report of the two auditors who had been appointed by the curator to make an examination of the books and accounts of the company. The auditors had reported as "finding the books and accounts in very unsatisfactory and deplorable condition."

Mr. Smith was on the stand all morning and asked to explain matters in his books, and give explanations on matters called for by the report of the curator.

F. R. Doyle appeared on behalf of the curator. Dr. L. A. Curry, K.C., on behalf of a large number of the shareholders and creditors. W. A. Irving also represented several creditors and shareholders.

The hearing will be continued this afternoon, and will probably last several days.

LOST PART DECK LOAD

Barkentine Emma R. Smith, Bound Here From Mobile, Was in Gale

A Vineyard Haven, Mass. despatch says that the barkentine Emma R. Smith, Mobile, for St. John, N. B., reports that in a gale on March 11, she was driven from the Gulf Stream, she lost a portion of her deckload of yellow pine and oak timber. The vessel sustained no other damage. The barkentine was at Vineyard Haven today.

The schooner has been engaged in the lumber trade between St. John and American ports but her new owner will use her in the trading business between St. John and Nova Scotia ports.

His hopes were frustrated however, as he was dismissed by the chief engineer, Joseph McFarland, and given in charge by him. Sergeant Campbell and Sergt. Baxter arrested the sailor, and this morning he was remanded until tomorrow.
