

- Q. Did you ever wear your uniform at Taber?
- A. I have been wearing it this last while. I have not been wearing it steady sir, no.
- Q. I notice -- did you bring your battledress back with you?
- A. Yes, sir, I had it on with a pair of civilian overalls on over top of what I had on.
- Q. When you were arrested?
- A. When I was arrested sir.
- Q. Where has your wife and your children been living since you were absent?
- A. At Taber.
- Q. They are at Taber now?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. By themselves?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. When did you bring them to Taber?
- A. I would say approximately a week or ten days after I came to Taber.
- Q. Now you are under oath. Did you send these telegrams about which you spoke asking for compassionate leave towards the end of July, 1943?
- A. I sent them, sir, before my furlough was up.
- Q. And what address did you give?
- A. The 9th Anti-Aircraft Battery, 27th Anti-Aircraft Regiment, and it was to Major Solloway.
- Q. And what was the return address that you gave?
- A. My usual address, box 344 Swift Current.
- Q. On both telegrams?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Court: Has this man's file been examined in connection with these statements to ascertain whether or not telegrams have been sent?
- Prosecutor: Not off-hand. I think it should be examined.
