(Continued from page 2) in his short line route, and now proposed to attempt a modified scheme, for which he had formed a Company in London. That Company now asked certain concessions in the way of land for a railway line and for terminals, and these it was proposed to give them, to become theirs if and when the proposed railway was built and not otherwise. If they did succeed in establishing themselves it would be of the greatest benefit to the Colony and well worth what we were offering them. If they did not we had lost nothing. The scheme might be considered by some to be impracticable, but modern changes were so rapid that there was no telling whether it was or was not possible. Mr. Thompson had in this case been able to interest one or two people of means in England and Scotland.

The Committee rose, reported progress and asked leave to sit again on Monday. The Premier gave notice of a bill relating to Municipal Affairs. The House then adjourned till Monday at 3 p.m. (To be Continued.)

There passed peacefully away on Saturday morning, May 16th, after an illness of only six days, Sarah Mercer, widow of the late Benjamin Mercer, at the advanced age of 96 years and 7 months. She was therefore the oldest person living in Bay Roberts. Deceased belonged to a very long-lived family. Her grandfather lived to see the fourth generation, her mother the same, and herself likewise. Mrs. Mercer was the daughter of the late Isaac and Patience Trenchard. Mrs. Mercer is survived by four sons, Benjamin, John, Henry and William, and two daughters, Mrs. James Mercer and Mrs. Nath Mercer. Her remains were laid to rest in the Methodist cemetery on Monday afternoon last. Revs. Swann and Grimes conducted the service at the church, Mr. Swann taking for his text 2 Timothy 4, 6, 7 and 8 vs.

After an illness which lasted for three years, there passed peacefully away on Saturday, May 16th, at the residence of her son, Thomas, Elizabeth, beloved wife of John Littlejohn, aged 75 years. Deceased was the daughter of the late John and Annie Squires. She leaves to mourn their loss a husband, two sons, Thomas and Samuel, and four daughters, Mrs. Wm. Snow, Mrs. James Bradbury, Mrs. James Mercer and Mrs. Robert Bishop, and 21 grandchildren.

The funeral took place on May 19th, interment being in the C. of E. Cemetery, Coley's Pt., Rev. Mr. Pike officiating. An appropriate sermon was delivered in which the preacher referred to the patience of the deceased under her sufferings. The text was taken from 1 Cor. 15, 42, 43. A large number of friends attended the funeral obsequies.

New Furness Pier

Work will start on the new pier for the Furness Line in the East End of the city by the first of next month, and it will likely employ about 75 to 100 men from then until the end of the year as the contract provides that the wharf and stores to be built thereon must be completed and handed over by December 31st. The job is being undertaken by the Nova Scotia Construction Co., and one of its officials will arrive here shortly to begin operations. With the slackness in other centres the starting of this work will be very acceptable to the class of men who will secure employment about it and will mean a substantial outlay in the East End of the city for some months to come.—Herald.

House Burned Down

A fire which completely consumed the dwelling house of Mr. James Joy occurred at 1 o'clock this (Friday) morning. The fire was discovered by the inmates of the house, who raised the alarm. Const. Wells, who lives opposite, was awakened by the alarm and was the first on the scene, followed by his son, Harry, and Mr. Patrick Dawson and his three sons. They endeavored to get some water, but the number was too small, as some of them were sent to rouse other citizens.

By this time all hopes of saving the house was abandoned, and with the help of willing men an effort was made to save the Roman Catholic church, which was successfully accomplished, although the clapboard was scorched.

A number of citizens worked hard, while others it is said, stood back and looked on, while they watched women carrying water. The origin of the fire is unknown. We understand the house and contents were insured. This is another example of the need of a proper fire fighting apparatus, for which the Guardian has been agitating for the past three years.

NOTICE.

The Attention of the Public is Called to the Following Provisions of the Act Respecting Saw Mill, 1914, Namely:—

Sec. 1.—Any bona fide fisherman who wishes to operate a saw mill for the purpose of preparing staves for heading, for making barrels, for fishery requirements, or for the making of shingles, lobster laths, or lobster boxes, whose whole out of timber for other purposes does not exceed 10,000 feet, board measure, in any one year, may obtain, free of cost, a license to operate a saw mill for such purposes, and any other purposes in such quantity subject to the following conditions:—

(a)—The license may be granted by the Minister of Agriculture and Mines for one year from the 30th November upon the application of the bona fide fisherman as aforesaid, who shall set forth in his application that he is such fisherman, and also the situation of his mill, its capacity, and the period during which it has been in operation. The Minister of Agriculture and Mines may in his discretion, renew the said license annually.

(b)—No person without obtaining a license as hereinbefore provided shall operate a saw mill of the class described in this section after six months from the passing of this Act, under a penalty not exceeding twenty dollars for every day when such mill is operated; and all such licenses issued before the 30th November of the present year shall terminate on the said date, on which date also the first royalty under said license shall be due and payable.

Sec. 2.—It shall be lawful for the Minister of Agriculture and Mines to issue licenses to persons or companies who are at present operating mills on what is known as the 'Three Mile Limit' and are not the holders of timber or pulp licenses under the Crown Lands Act, to cut timber to operate saw mills for one year from the 30th November, which said license shall be renewable at the discretion of the Minister of Agriculture and Mines on the payment of a fee of Five Dollars. The licensee of any such license shall pay as a royalty the sum of one dollar per thousand feet, board measure, on all lumber sawn or manufactured in the mill operated under authority thereof.

(c)—Application for such license shall be made to the Minister of Agriculture and Mines accompanied by fee of Five Dollars, and before the issue of such license the Minister of Agriculture and Mines shall cause to be published for a period of thirty days, by affixing the same at a Post Office or other public building in the neighbourhood of the situation of the mill proposed to be operated under such license, a notice setting forth the fact that such license has been applied for.

(d)—No person not being the holder of a timber or pulp license under the Crown Lands Act shall, without the issue of a license as in this Act provided, operate after one month after the passing of this Act a Saw Mill for the manufacture of timber cut on Crown land under a penalty not exceeding twenty dollars for every day when such mill is operated; and all such licenses issued before the 30th November of the present year shall terminate on the said date, on which date also the first royalty under such license shall be due and payable.

Sec. 4.—The Governor in Council may when it shall be made to appear to him to be for the interest of the Colony by proclamation to be published in the Royal Gazette, prevent the ridding of growing or standing trees on the public lands of the Colony or portion of the same, or lands held under license, lease or grant, for the purpose of taking away the rinds of the said trees for any purpose whatever.

Sec. 5.—The penalty for the infraction of any of the provisions and conditions of this Act, where such penalty has not been fixed by any preceding section of this Act, or by the Crown Lands Act, shall be a fine not exceeding ten dollars for each infraction thereof. All penalties under this Act may be sued for in the name of the Minister of Agriculture and Mines before a Stipendiary Magistrate or Justice of the Peace by any Timber Inspector or other person authorized by the Minister of Agriculture and Mines.
