Any person who is the sole head of family, or any male over it years old, may homestead: a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Sasikatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years.
