After some evidence was taken McCaustlin was allowed out on bail and Wiley was remanded to jail.

Hard on Consumers.

During a conversation with one of the foremost wholesale grocers of the city yesterday the Standard was informed of some facts in relation to the bean market which form an answer to the contention of the Liberals that the passing of the reciprocity pact would result in lowering the cost of living. At present this merchant said beans are considerably higher than they have been for years. The crop in Ontario is a short one but farmers are refusing to part with them on the bare possibility that reciprocity will pass, in which case they will ship the crop to the United States where there is also a shortage. If this takes place and the Liberals are returned to power it will mean that this item in living will advance in price.

MANAGER OF C.P.R. HERE YESTERDAY

D. McNichol, vice president and general manager of the C. P. R. spent yesterday in the city, leaving last evening to resume his inspection of the Atlantic division of the railway.

Before leaving last evening, Mr. McNichol said that he had during the day visited the West Side of the harbor and had inspected the company's property and had also gone over the portion of land recently acquired from the city. While there is a probability of the work of filling being undertaken this fall, Mr. McNichol said that the work on Mill street is not to be interfered with, and will be carried along as quickly as possible so that everything will be ready for the coming season; but if possible to do so, this season, the work on the West Side will be undertaken. Speaking of the company's plans for a freight car ferry service between St. John and Digby, Mr. McNichol stated that while there are difficulties such as the long run between the two points, he believes the system can be put into effect. No site has been definitely fixed upon for terminals for the ferry, should the plans be put into effect. Mr. McNichol was accompanied to the city by Sir Thomas Tait.

LIBERALS LOVE THE LABORER--PERHAPS

Make Farcical Appeal to Working Men -- Grits' Record, However, is Against Them and Their Bid for Labor Vote is Taken at Face Value.

"A more farcical appeal on behalf of the Liberal candidates than that addressed by the Telegraph and Times to the workmen could not be imagined," said a St. John workman last night.

"Of course the Telegraph and Times are champions of the working class. They showed their love for the workman during the printers' strike. They have always been an eager promoter of the welfare of the workers as the Liberal government. So they are quite in their element when telling what the Liberal government has done for the workman. And no doubt would be more so telling what the Liberal government has done to the workman.

No Credit to Government.

"It is a rather far-fetched proceeding to claim credit for the Liberal government for passing an eight-hour act. Every workman knows something of the history of the eight hour bill, introduced into the Federal Parliament by Mr. Verville, the labor member. When the bill came back from the committee which the Liberal government maintains to manage measures in the interests of the masses, Mr. Verville did not know it. It had been so mutilated that the Executive of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada condemned it, and resolutions were passed by the Trades and Labor Councils in this province protesting against the government's treatment of the bill. Mr. Verville wanted to withdraw the bill as amended, but finally, realizing that he could get nothing else from the labor loving Liberals, he let it go.

NOMINATIONS WILL BE RECEIVED TODAY

Returning Officer at Court House at 2 O'clock—Qualifications Required of Candidates for Nomination.

Today is nomination day, but as the candidates have decided to abandon the old custom of holding a joint meeting, the proceedings in connection with the nomination of the candidates will be without interest. A. O. Skinner, the returning officer, will be at the Court House from noon to 2 p. m. to receive nominations. Candidates are required to have their nomination papers signed by at least 25 electors, and to put up a deposit of \$200, which will be returned if they receive at least half the number of votes polled by the successful competitor.

No special qualifications are essential, as regards real estate, so any British subject may be a candidate so long as he is not disqualified by being a member of the legislative assembly, a government employee (except a cabinet minister) one of certain public officers, a government contractor, or one at any election proved guilty on the trial of an election petition of any corrupt practice, of bribery or undue influence in his election, during the period of seven years from the time he was so proved or convicted.

SUDDEN DEATH A SHOCK TO FRIENDS

Wm. A. McGinley Passed Away Yesterday -- Encouraging Reports Had Given Rise to Hopes of Recovery.

The news of the death of William A. McGinley yesterday morning came as a sudden shock to his many friends, especially as on Tuesday his condition was reported to be so much improved that strong hopes were entertained of his recovery. The direct cause of Mr. McGinley's death was a severe attack of typhoid fever contracted at Moose Jaw about three weeks ago while on a trip to the west.

COLORED FOLK IN LINE AGAINST PACT

That the colored population will vote against reciprocity and annexation to the United States, was the statement made to The Standard last evening by a member of the local colored community.

"You can bet your life that we don't want to get linked up with no United States," he said with tremendous earnestness. "Where does the colored man get his rights? In his British countries, ain't it? And do you think we want to see the British flag hauled down in this country and the obnoxious Americans coming over here and interfering with us? No, sah. How do them Americans treat the colored folk in their own country down south? White folk chase them off the sidewalk and won't let them vote at elections, unless they are sure they're going to vote as the white folk want them to."

"And what kind of justice do they give the colored folk? Lynch them first and try them after they're shot full of holes and burned up at a stake. 'Do we want reciprocity, or annexation with them folk? Not for mine. We don't want no dealings with the people who use the colored folk like the Americans do.'"
