

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEACHERS' SALARIES

Tabled in the Legislature Yesterday Contains Many Recommendations.

The following is the report of a committee appointed to investigate and report to the N. B. legislature on the question of teachers' salaries.

To His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor and Members of the Legislative Assembly: Gentlemen—Your committee appointed under the provisions of a resolution of the Legislature...

(1) That equal pay be given for equal work, and that female teachers who are at present paid the same amounts of government money as males for grammar and superior classes of schools...

Assessment values vary greatly in the various parishes and counties. Some districts, chiefly in rural areas, are assessed at full value, other districts varying from two-thirds to one-quarter of the assessed value...

Such inequalities as have been pointed out in rate of taxation and modes of assessment do not provide equal opportunities for pupils nor equal burdens for ratepayers.

At present (Sec. 4, Sch. Man.) the county assessment for schools is sum equal to 30 cents per head of population according to the last census, imposed upon the property of each county...

The future welfare of the province depends upon its teachers and schools more than upon any other agency. Schools should be high enough to attract a living wage but also to reward training and competency.

It is also necessary that we should be able to meet the competition of other parts of the province. At the present time all branches of unskilled labor are paid more than many of our trained teachers.

Your committee would take this occasion to recommend that legislation be enacted giving any parish the option of voting upon the desirability of the place of the present district school boards. This would enable larger salaries to be paid teachers, because the burden of taxation would be distributed over wider areas, and better paid districts would be better able to support a better class of schools.

"THE NEW POOR" IN GREAT BRITAIN. Sad Plight of the Owners of Moderate Incomes and Salary Earners.

(Brooklyn Eagle.) Major Ian Hay Bell, in his interview in the Sunday Eagle, crystallized a wholly new social condition, both in England and here, in his phrase, "The New Poor."

The situation thus outlined in England is precisely the same as our own and the likeness argues well for the wisdom of the middle class union which was incorporated here in Brooklyn last week.

Major Bell pointed out that the old class of landed proprietors had been wiped out by war taxation and that the men of those families are going into professions to earn a livelihood. There remains the very rich, most of whom have made money during the war; the members of labor unions, whose earnings have been greatly increased, and the middle class between these two, made up of workers who draw salaries as distinguished from wages and whose pay has not been increased in proportion to the increased cost of living.

THE MEN'S GUILD OF KNOX CHURCH. A very interesting lecture was given the Men's Guild of Knox Church by the Rev. Moorehouse Legate last evening, who took as his subject "Fiji and the Pilgrims."
